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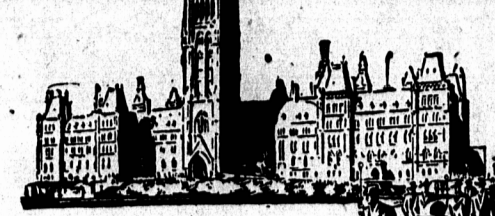

OTTAWA LETTER

I regret very much that I was unable to prepare a story for last week. I had to visit my home and I was kept there all the week. It was the first time that I missed a story in the last three years. I hope that nothing will compel me to miss a story again.

There were a large number from Prince Edward Island on the train coming back. Most of them were going to Saskatoon to attend a Legion convention. Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lowther, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Lowther and James Walker from Charlottetown and Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Titus from Summerside were making the trip. I also had a chat with Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Morris from Charlottetown who were going to Montreal to attend the graduation of their daughter.

Last night the Minister of Finance delivered his second budget speech to a crowded House. Long before seven o'clock the corridors leading to the public galleries were crowded with persons anxious to gain admittance, many had to be turned away while others were content to stand in the back of the galleries throughout the hour and a half it took the Minister to present his budget.

The press had been given copies of the budget speech at five in the afternoon. They were taken into Room 277, the Railway Committee room, and the doors were locked until eight o'clock. This would permit them to have their stories ready by the time Mr. Abbott started to make his statement in the House at eight. This is a custom that started about two years ago, and seems to have worked very well. It is just a thoughtful courtesy extended to that hard-working splendid body, the press gallery.

It is rather too soon to gauge accurately public opinion on this budget. The first impression seems to be one of regret that there were not more sweeping tax reductions, and that income tax exemptions were not increased.

It is important, however, to re-

member, that Canada still must fight the menace of inflation. There is only so much consumer goods in Canada and no amount of reduction in taxation would increase this amount. In fact more money would be released with which people could bid against each other for these commodities and thus force the prices up. It is important also to remember that in last year's budget substantial tax reductions were made. Budgets can not be prepared in the spirit of previous budgets and budgets to come.

Recent government financing is based on the sound but homely philosophy that in times of prosperity one should prepare for a rainy day. Canada is going through one of its greatest periods of prosperity. If a substantial reduction in the national debt can not now be made it is difficult to understand when it could be made. The surplus of \$670,000,000 reported by Mr. Abbott should meet with the approval of all the taxpayers in Canada. It is also gratifying to know that the net debt of Canada has been reduced by \$1,043,000,000 from the peak of two years ago. It now stands at \$12,378,000,000.

The increase in income tax exemptions to those over sixty-five will prove a boon to those aged civil servants who have been trying to get along on pensions which were small ten years ago but must now be almost inadequate with the increased cost of living. These retired civil servants have no opportunity to augment their incomes and they must have felt the pinch. This increase in exemption will materially help their financial position.

Then two consequences follow: (1) Communism is without race prejudice. (That is about the only difference between Communism and Fascism). (2) Communism is therefore essentially committed to foster revolution in all lands. It follows, too, that a Communist cannot owe allegiance to the State in which he lives, because that State is to him an inimical and evil thing.

The Manifesto goes on to prescribe the very tactics which we see today. "The proletariat of each country must first of all settle matters with its own bourgeoisie." But "the Communists everywhere support every revolutionary movement." And in the very voice of Mr. Molotov it goes on to say, "The Communists labor everywhere for the union and agreement of the democratic parties of all countries."

Lastly there is a theory which Marx mentions briefly in his Manifesto, and which Lenin seized and amplified; that even the new revolutionary State and system were "transitional." They would last only as long as was necessary to accustom all men to the idea of "a classless society." When all were equal the State would "with away" because there would be no oppressed class to rescue or prevent from revolting, and no oppressors to destroy. A blessed word "transitional." It can excuse or explain anything.

Are millions sent to concentration camps without charge or trial? Well, don't worry, that is only "transitional."

Does the glorious revolution seem only to have put one gang in the place of another? No matter, it is only "transitional."

Do community of property and equality of reward prove to be shams? Do not distress yourselves. All these things are "transitional" and the end justifies the means.

What is the difference between Communism and Socialism? asks the writer in the Daily Telegraph. "By far the greatest difference can be described as ruthlessness. Both believe in the class war—Mr. Shinwell (British Socialist) has explained that only his own class counts, and the rest don't matter "a tinker's cuss." But the Communists would shoot in the war, while the Socialists say they would not.

Apart from his mental makeup, with its qualities of arrogance and frightfulness, Marx had really thought out Socialism farther than the preliminary stage of "smash and grab." As his attacks on Proudhon and other "reactionary Socialists" show, he had realized that the attempt to graft State Socialism on to Democracy might, and even must, fail. What then must Socialists do when faced with failure? "Stage a complete revolution," answers Marx. "We don't quite know," answer the bourgeois Socialists. "Perhaps something will turn up to prevent failure, and in any case there will be plenty of excuses."

A second difference between the two is a difference in political morality. The Communist is conscientiously unscrupulous because of his doctrine that the end justifies the means. Many Socialists are scrupulously conscientious. Still, this does not vindicate the Socialists' claim to be the best bulwark against Communism: for, as Marx rather grudgingly acknowledges, Socialism prepares the ground for Communism. The immediate, as distinct from the long-distance, programmes of the two are identical. So, in short, Socialism is Communism's own indispensable base.
