There are at present 163 licensed boats engaged in oyster fishing in Queen's County on East, West, North, and Vernon River, Pownal Bay, Seal River, Orwell and Pinnite. The bulk of their catch is handled by their dealers in Charlottetown. The price paid is from \$6.30 to \$7.00 per barrel, and in some cases fishermen are making as high as \$50 per week. The fishing in Vernon River which was only started about two years ago is proving very profitable this season, and the oysters are improving in quality.
