Montreal Wheat Shipment Higher

MONTREAL, Aug. 4.—Between the opening of navigation and the last of July 61,425,000 bushels of grain have passed through this port, according to Dr. W. L. McDonald, President of the Harbor Commission, as compared with 54,328,625 in the same period of 1923. Dr. McDonald believes that the record of 155,000,000 bushels of wheat in 1922, would be broken this year.

Sergeant Salt swore that the consul raised his elbow came as if to strike. Then the "Mounties" pushed his elbow a little using the consul's energy against himself, so that he tumbled backwards. He denied that he or any of his constables had taken the consul by the throat.

R. L. Calder, crown prosecutor, declared the case for the crown closed and the defense will begin on Monday.
