LIVESTOCK MARKETS (Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 23—Cattle 610. Cattle sold slowly today. The Montreal livestock markets at prices variously estimated to be 25c to 50c lower than last Monday. One load of well finished steers averaging 1170 pounds brought \$7.25. Three or four lots of medium to good steers brought \$6.50 to \$6.75, and the bulk of the medium steers sold around \$6. Light thin steers culled out sold as low as \$4.50. The bulk of the cows were plain to medium quality and were sold between \$3 and \$4. Good cows sold around \$4.50 with odd tops picked up to \$5. Bulls sold between \$3.50 and \$5 with an odd one bringing up to \$5.50.

Quotations:—Butcher steers good \$6.50 to \$7.25; medium \$5.75 to \$6.50; common \$4.50 to \$5.; medium \$3 to \$4.25; canners \$1.50 to \$1.75; Cattle \$2 to \$2.50; butcher bulls \$1.50 to \$2.; common \$3.50 to \$4.50. Sheep Receipts 643. The calves were mostly veals of plain to medium quality. Prices were about steady. Sales were made early at prices ranging from \$8.50 to \$10.50; with the bulk between \$8.50 and \$9; Common drink were sold around \$6.50 there were only grass calves and were sold for \$4.

Quotations:—Good veal \$9.50 to \$10.50; medium \$9 to \$9.50; common \$8.50 to \$9.75; grass \$4. Sheep Receipts 64. There were only 14 sheep and lambs offered. Lambs were mostly bucks and they were sold for \$7 to \$7.50 including an odd ewe. Sheep were mostly \$4 to \$5.50. Quotations:—Ewes \$4 to \$5.50; common \$6.50 to \$7.50. Hog Receipts 1874. Six or seven hundred local hogs were sold at \$6 to \$8.25 for hams, butchers and lights; there were no early bids on western hogs. Heavies brought \$7.50 to \$7.75 and sows \$7 to \$7.50.

Halifax Now On Air Map

Halifax Aero Club Takes Over Management of Municipal Landing Field And Arranges For Extension of Canadian Airways Service

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 22.—When Lord Tennyson saw "the heavens filled with commerce," it is to be wondered how specific his 19th century idea of the "pilots of the purple twilight" was. There is more truth than poetry in the progress of 20th century aviation in Canada. According to a statement issued by the Civil Aviation Branch of the Department of National Defense at Ottawa, Canada has 309 private air pilots, 402 commercial pilots, and 370 air engineers. During 1930 alone there were 300 pilot licenses issued—175 private and 125 commercial.

Canadian air harbors number 69. Of these, Halifax has been made the eastern terminus of the Dominion's largest aerial transportation company having been linked up in the trans-Canada service operated by the Maritime Airways Limited a subsidiary of the Canada Airways Limited. This same organization recently inaugurated a passenger and freight service between Moncton and Montreal, via Saint John.

The Halifax Aero Club has leased the landing field of the Halifax Airport for one year on the following basis:

1—The City to erect a hangar at a cost of approximately \$2,000.

2—The Aero Club to pay ten per cent toward the cost of the hangar.

3—The Aero Club to take complete control of the operation of the landing field without cost to the city for maintenance or management.

4—All revenue from the operation of the airport to be divided on a fifty-fifty basis between the city and the Aero Club.

R. J. E. Nelson, president of the Halifax Aero Club, makes the following statement:

"Now that the Halifax Aero Club is going to operate the landing field on Chebucto road, I am prepared to say that within a very short while there will be established between Halifax and Saint John a service that will be available for both passenger and express business offering, and this independent of the air mail service which will soon be carried on to and from Halifax."

With the extension of the air service to Halifax, the final link in the Canadian Airways chain in the east will be forged and Halifax and Nova Scotia business men will be provided with a six hour service to Montreal.

An air mail service from Moncton to the Magdalen Islands was established in 1928. The following year marked the first direct service between Central Canada and Saint John. In the same year a survey of the Prince Edward Island airmail service (Moncton-SummerSide-Charlottetown) during the winter season showed that sixty four flights were made from Moncton to Charlottetown and fifty four from Charlottetown to the mainland.
