The second article forms the conclusion of the series of six articles which have appeared during the past two years upon British Diplomacy and Canada. It is a paper of nearly 30 pages by the editor, Dr. Andrew McPhail, in which he sums up the whole of British Diplomacy in so far as it concerns Canada. He deals in a broad way with the Oregon Award, the Ashburton Treaty the Alaskan Award, the Reciprocity Treaty. A startling statement is made under the Ashburton Treaty Great Britain secured 900 miles more territory than she was entitled to.

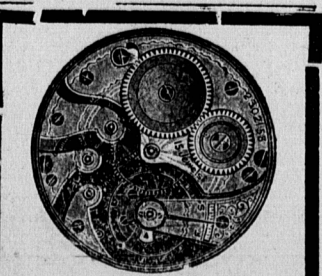
