CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

General
Satisfactory conditions continue in the Prairie Provinces and prospects indicate a good all round crop. Damage from hail and pests is unimportant in aggregate. Prospects in the other provinces with the exception of New Brunswick, which has suffered from drought, continue satisfactory. Details follow:—

Prairie Provinces.
EDMONTON DISTRICT: crops making rapid growth. Hail prevalent covering small area with light damage. **CALGARY DISTRICT:** prospects still excellent. 60 to 100% wheat headed out. Oats and barley well advanced. Some damage by hail at a few points and some recovery are being made from previous storms. **LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT:** crops continue to show splendid promise. Hot weather prevails with heavy rains. In a few localities scattered hail storms reported but area of damage not large. A few outlying districts anticipate limited yield, due to lack of moisture, but otherwise all reports favourable. Heavy crop (mostly hay on irrigated land). **SASKATOON DISTRICT:** weather favourable. Prospects generally satisfactory although rust in evidence in some districts. Hay crop good and pasture plentiful. **REGINA DISTRICTS:** crop generally reported good but rust has developed in several districts. Some damage from hail. Hay and pasture good. **WINNIPEG DISTRICTS:** prospects continue favourable, no serious damage from hail pests or rust. Fall rye fair crop, cutting general. Other coarse grain doing well. Pasture and hay good.

Province of Quebec
A fair crop of grain is expected. Growth is a little backward. Corn is improving and average crop expected. Hay in most districts above average. Roots have good appearance and general average crop being looked for. Small fruit in most districts plentiful with apples a little below average. Pasture is generally good.

Province of Ontario.
General districts very satisfactory. Good harvest weather in western part of Province, east somewhat later and in need of rain

BRINGING UP FATHER—



Says League Of Nations Saved Eastern Europe

OTTAWA, Ont., July 30.—The proceedings of the fourth General Assembly of the League of Nations which opens in Geneva on Sept. 3 will be reported for the League of Nations Society in Canada by its European representative, W. G. Charles Doyle, who is resident in Ghent and travels extensively throughout Continental Europe in connection with the League's work.

He has recently transmitted to Ottawa an interview which he has had with Dr. Alfred Grunberger, Austrian Minister for Foreign Affairs regarding the action of the League towards financial reconstruction in his country. It is of interest to Canadians to know that Dr. Grunberger's wife was formerly Miss Davidson, a native of Nova Scotia, where she has recently been visiting. His son, furthermore, is a student at Toronto University.

Dr. Grunberger said that before the loss of Trieste, Austria's, unique port on the Adriatic, that country was closely in touch with Canada through the Canadian Pacific Railway. In Austria he desired to renew relations with the Dominion, with a view to exporting Austria's manufactured articles and getting Canada's much-needed grain.

The work of the League of Nations, Dr. Grunberger held, had averted a catastrophe in Eastern Europe. Austria was near financial collapse and Italy, Czechoslovakia and other countries stood ready to intervene. With their currency stabilized the Austrian people felt a renewed security. A year ago they had contemplated wholesale emigration, while today there was

British House To Have Busy Week

(British United Press)
LONDON, July 30.—The final week of the present session of parliament will be marked by matters of great interest and importance.

The premier stated that the decision of the Cabinet as to the policy to be pursued in the matter of defence from an attack from the air will be announced tomorrow. It is expected that recommendations of the Imperial Defence Committee will be followed and the present policy maintained which will probably result in the resignation of members of the Board of the Admiralty who demand separate control of a naval wing of the air force.

Tomorrow the condition of foreign affairs will be discussed with regard to the Ruhr situation which is discussed though it is doubtful whether the government will be able to present its full case owing to delay in the transmission of the French and Belgian replies to the draft of the British note to Germany which are anxiously awaited. A statement by the premier will therefore be deferred to the last days of the session.

On Thursday a large attendance of members will most likely be attracted for discussion on the functions of the government publicity departments which will probably result in the abolition of certain lucrative offices which however necessary during war are now considered superfluous.
