In commenting on the quality of the birds, Mr. Darnell states that the turkeys are not quite up to last year in quality while the chickens surpass last year's stock.

The market is the strongest for years and years with all sales at top calling prices. There is a strong demand from outside markets as well as local trade.

3 Britons Describe started swimming toward five or six Japanese auxiliaries that were cruising slowly between them and the land in the distance. Some of those in the water were shot by the Japanese, the refugees charged. Suddenly the vessel sank, leaving only the crossbeams of the masts above water. Those prisoners who could make their way on rafts to the Japanese ships, which picked up a few, but made no real effort to save the majority.

The three survivors who reached China said they passed close to one Japanese vessel but that their cries for help were ignored along with those of hundreds of others.

Picked Up By Chinese After they were in the water three hours, Wallace, Johnston and Evans were picked up by Chinese fishermen who landed them on an island. Altogether, about 200 men reached the island, but the next morning a Japanese destroyer appeared and forced most of the group to surrender.

The trio hid successfully, however, and eventually made their way to Free China. Information from Germany indicates that the "lost" British are being held in a camp in the southwest of Japan. It is said the transport had been torpedoed off the coast of Chekiang Province.
