Prince Of Wales Participated In Polo Match

Inspection of Scots Didn't Materialize Because of Riotous Acts in Bombay

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The Prince of Wales on Monday, the fifth day of his visit in Bombay, participated in a polo match, according to a Bombay despatch to the London Times. He was to have inspected twenty thousand boy and girl scouts, but the parents in the remote city parts were afraid to have their children pass through the recently disturbed areas and the inspection was abandoned reluctantly.

Fears that the day would bring further disorders proved unnecessary. Hindus and Parsees paraded the streets, waving white flags amid the cheers of the warring sects, and up to the time darkness came, when the Times' despatch was filled, there was no trouble.

The Prince spent a quiet Sunday, taking lunch informally at the Orient Yacht Club and attending services in the Cathedral.

Economy in Feeding

The question of a feed ration is always an important one with those who are feeding farm crops, particularly so in a year such as the present. Due to excessive dry weather all over Eastern Canada when Hay and roughage have increased to such an extent in value as quoted at the present time, and where feed must be purchased to carry over valuable breeding animals as well as where additional concentrates are used in the production of milk, it is wise for the buyer to consider carefully which of the feeds that he is able to purchase will give him the most profit. We are submitting herewith a comparison of feed values based on the present price of corn, which can be secured for \$35 a ton by carload lot and figuring the food value on the Scandinavian Feed Unit System, a system of feed equivalents based mainly on the extensive experiments with milk cows and swine at the Copenhagen Station and adopted in Denmark and other Scandinavian countries for measuring the relative production economy of cows. It has great merit, and is used extensively by the Scandinavian farmers who are leaders in the production of dairy products and hogs. The farmers of Denmark buy yearly thousands of tons of mill feeds and concentrates from America, pay the freight to their own country and feed them with profit, selling the product on the British market in competition with our own. They are experts in the balancing and cheapening of rations, and we submit a statement figured on the basis of the feed values, such as—

formerly engaged therein to other lands," it adds, "The National Policy UNDER WHICH CANADA GENERALLY HAS ACHIEVED SUCH SPLENDID DEVELOPMENT, has not extended its benefits TO THE INDUSTRIES OF THIS PROVINCE, for the reasons above set forth." If this be true, and there is no doubt but that it is that by raising the small Customs and Excise tax of \$3.00 per capital, which this Island then had against the rest of Canada, THESE INDUSTRIES WERE DRIVEN TO OTHER LANDS, how equally and forcibly true it is that by wiping away the Canadian tariff wall as against the powerful industrial United States with its 120,000,000, our weaker Canadian industries will similarly be "driven to other lands," or more plainly sent across the American border.

When Mr. D. A. McKinnon got to the subject of extravagance and economy it sounded so plainly like the echo of Hon. J. H. Bell's speeches prior to the provincial election that we felt like pinching ourself to make sure that it was not a dream, and like in the Bell Government case, if the electors submit to being similarly fooled, they will feel like kicking themselves. Mr. McKinnon holds up his eyes in holy horror at the increased postal cost over that in the Laurier days. Is he so asleep to the progress of today, or is it in ignorance that he does not know that AN IMMENSE PARCEL POST SYSTEM, has been established which did not exist under the Laurier antediluvian system? Does he not know that RURAL MAIL DELIVERY has been also established in every part of Canada? Is he so intensely green as not to know that the man who in the Laurier day could live on a dollar a day now requires three times as much? Does he imagine that all these mail carriers are working for charity, providing their teams and finding themselves? How is he going to better it? Does he propose to DISPENSE WITH THIS SERVICE, or is it his plan TO CUT THEIR WAGES? This is the only way in which he can practice his economy, and NOW IS THE PROPER TIME FOR HIM TO TELL THESE POSTAL DELIVERY MEN WHICH COURSE HE WILL PURSUE AGAINST THEM, IF THEY GIVE HIM THE CHANCE.
