**FAVORS WOMEN CLERGY FOR ANGLICAN CHURCH**

**Bishop Welldon Joins Dean Inge in Declaring Women Competent as Clergymen.**

LONDON, APRIL 23.—The dispute between high Anglican dignitaries regarding the admission of women to holy orders continues. Let it be said at once that the dispute is conducted with charity and dignity befitting the disputants and the subject. Dean Inge, of St. Paul's Cathedral, has declared women competent to do all the work that the lower order of the clergy already do. Dr. Henson, Bishop of Durham, finds no reason for justifying so great a breach with the traditions of Christendom.

Bishop Welldon, Dean of Durham, the latest notable divine to voice his sentiments on the subject, says if ordination took place it must be guarded by strict safeguards. He could hardly believe that women like Florence Nightingale, and others who had done noble work in the religious life of the nation, would not be made admirable deacons and priests, and he believed that the time would come when ordination of carefully selected and disciplined women would be an accomplished fact.

It seemed to him to be idle to say that the function of women was to be good wives and mothers if there were millions of women who could not be wives or mothers at all. Not only was the number of women largely in excess of men, but marriage had become so expensive that many men shrunk from it. He found it difficult to believe that if the State treated women on an equal basis with men the Church would always be able to keep them on a basis of inferiority. It seemed illogical that women should be admitted, as no doubt they would be to the Cabinet, and yet be excluded from the diaconate. It seemed safer that women should make their confession to women than to men.

**Woman Makes Nails For South America**

**TURNS OUT A SPECIAL TYPE OF HAND-WROUGHT IRON NAILS IN HER SMITHY IN "BLACK COUNTRY."**

LONDON, April 23.—At Lye, in the Black Country, a woman nail-maker, Mrs. Brettie, who carries on her craft in a small outhouse equipped as a forge and smithy, has just begun the execution of two contracts from South America for the supply of a special type of hand-wrought iron nails. The contracts will probably keep her busy for many weeks, and she will be working hard with the frequent assistance of her young niece, who operates the hand-bellows of the forge. She has the sight of one eye only, for that of the other was lost in an accident some years ago. Mrs. Brettie, who is sixty six, is one of the very few remaining workers in this old craft of the Black Country. There are probably not more than fifty people, all of them elderly, who know from experience the methods of the craft and probably less than half that number who still earn a living by it. A few generations ago the making of wrought-iron nails by hand was carried on in hundreds of homes in Lye and other small towns in the Black Country. Small houses, or cottages, were adapted for the purpose, and an anvil, a furnace of sorts, hammers and chisels comprised the equipment. The iron, in long rods, was supplied by local factors, by whom the outworkers were engaged. The rods were heated, cut into sections, and hammered to form the heads and points, and the dexterity of the blows enabled the production of nails at an astonishingly rapid rate.

But, though the output from individual families—all of whom, from any given town, were engaged in the work—was often quite prodigious, having regard to the methods, the workers for the greater part lived in abject poverty, and the conditions of the industry were notoriously bad.

The advent of machine methods nearly extinguished the hand-wrought trade, but a certain demand for hand-wrought nails persisted, since for certain purposes, notably the shoeing of horses, they remained better than anything that the machine could produce.

**THE MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)

**EGGS**

OTTAWA, Ont., April 23.—Canadian egg markets are steady and in an unsettled condition. Recent cold weather has slowed up production and storing is not yet in full swing. American markets are higher today.

TORONTO.—The local market is steady. Country shippers are paying producers extras 27; firsts 25; seconds 22, and are making sales at extras 29c; 31c; firsts 27-29c; seconds 22-24c fob.

MONTREAL.—There has been very little change in this egg market. Dealers continue to buy from country shippers at extras 30-32c; firsts 28-29c; seconds 25-27c. Car has been sold from Saskatoon for shipment this week at extras 29c; firsts 27c; seconds 24c.

CALGARY.—Wintry weather in Southern Alberta recently has brought about a falling off of egg receipts, 2 cars being brought in from B. C. Prices to country shippers are 1 cent higher at extras 25; firsts 23; seconds 21.

VANCOUVER.—This market is steady and unchanged with dealers buying from producers at extras 23-25; firsts 20-22; pulled extras 18 cents; there is a heavy movement into storage and a number of cars are being shipped to the Prairies and to the East for storing.

MONTREAL, Que., April 23.—There was some demand from exporters for Canadian western oats on the Montreal grain market, today and a sale of 20,000 bushels of

tough no. 3 Canadian western were made at five cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option of Montreal for shipment from Fort William. The carlot trade on spot was quiet and prices were unchanged. Prices for all grades for spring and winter wheat flour were firmly maintained under a limited demand. A moderate amount of business was worked with United States buyers in quilled. The local trade was also active and standard grades were dull but prices were steady. The under-trade in the egg market was firm but the volume of business was small. The receipts were 3,049 cases. The demand for potatoes continued in a firm feeling prevailed in the market for imported beans on account of the somewhat limited supplies available on spot. Sales of carlots of choice white handpicked beans to arrive were made at \$4.20 per bushel, ex-track, and smaller quantities at \$4.40 per bushel, ex-store. A moderate amount of business was done in the under-trade and the market was steady. The receipts were 815 packages. An easier feeling prevailed in the cheese trade and prices were a fraction lower. The receipts were 242 boxes.

**Land Masses Eliminated From Polar Regions**

NEW YORK, April 23.—Five reported or imagined masses of land have been eliminated from the maps by the flight of Captain George H. Wilkins and Lieutenant Carl B. Eielson over the roof of the world.

Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Wilkins' former chief, after considering data received by radio, noted today that on the flight from Point Barrow, Alaska, to Green Bay, Spitzbergen, over the Polar Basin, Wilkins and Eielson failed to see Kanan land, Harris land, the land which Frederick A. Cook reported in his tale of a visit to the North Pole, that reported by Admiral Peary and that which Stefansson thought he had just missed finding in 1917.

Going over the flight story of Wilkins, the Australian, systematically, Stefansson traced his course and concluded that visibility would have allowed the fliers to see any or all of these land masses if they had existed.
