George, when, as Chancellor of the Exchequer, he said that drink was a more dangerous foe than Germany. This was, of course, oratorical nonsense, but it served the purpose of making the public receptive to suggestions of restriction.

Mr. George was then ready to establish prohibition for the duration of the war, or to buy up every mug of beer, tot of whisky and glass of wine in the country and have the state control its future sale.

Public houses are open only five and a half hours a day. In no district are they open after 9.30 p.m. Treating is prohibited. There are no credit sales. Spirits for consumption off the premises are sold for only two and a half hours a day, and not at all on Saturdays and Sundays.

In France and Switzerland sawdust and wood have lately been experimented with for gas making, says Popular Science. Ten per cent of sawdust added to coal, it is reported, has given good results in Geneva, and logs of wood have likewise proved satisfactory for the same purpose. Condensed flour was carbonized at Royan and produced a good quality of gas.

ASSISTED IN BURYING HIS FRIEND

Young, who enlisted with the 105th., was later transferred to the 104th., and crossed to France in February last, in a draft for the 26th. The Jack McPherson referred to is from Wood Islands and was killed in action on Aug. 8th. France, Aug. 14th.

Dear Sister—I suppose you have been reading in the papers about the big battle and will be anxious to hear news from me. I came out of it without a scratch and I hope my luck holds good. Our Batt. did not get it as bad as some of the others did. We sure gave old Fritz the worst pounding he ever got. It was an awful scrap, and I cannot commence to tell you anything about it; only I am writing on Fritz's paper and using one of his pencils to write with. Well I suppose you have heard before this about poor Jack McPherson being killed. I found his body in a shell hole the day after the battle. He had been wounded in the left arm, and had it dressed, and must have been going out with it, when he got a bullet through the bowels. He died sitting with his head in his hand and he looked quite natural. I saw that he was buried alright and his grave marked by a wooden cross, with his name and number on it. I am going to try and see Damond Ross to-day. He is quite near to us here and came out of it alright too. Well I will close for this time, so goodbye. Your Loving Brother Pearly.
