CHURCH REOPENED AT WOLFVILLE AFTER RECONSTRUCTION

WOLFVILLE, May 5.—Yesterday was a red-letter day in local Methodist circles. The occasion was the re-opening of the church, after extensive repairs to the interior of the edifice, and installation of a new pipe organ. At the morning service the Rev. A. C. Borden, D. D., of Canning, formerly minister of J. Wesley Smith Memorial church, Halifax, was the preacher, speaking from the text, 2 Timothy 1:10.

His sermon was brimful of truths concerning the future life, and was followed by an anthem which effectively enforced the doctrine of immortality, the subject of the sermon in his introductory remarks Dr. Borden alluded to the fact that it was

in this church he was converted, and subsequently received his call to the ministry.
Dr. G. M. Campbell, of Mt. Allison, Sackville, was the speaker at the afternoon service. The theme of his address was: "Our Canadian Heritage and Responsibility."
Dr. Campbell preached with his characteristic eloquence at the evening service, taking as his theme: "Christ's attitude towards sinners." The congregations at all the services were large and enthusiastic.
The choir under the capable leadership of A. J. Woodman fully sustained its reputation for music of great excellence.
Mrs. E. F. Moore, of Dartmouth, until recently the efficient organist of the church, presided at the organ.
