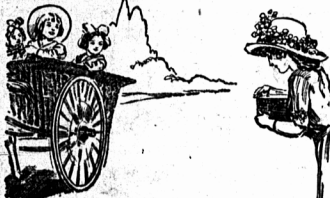

REBUILDING ST. DUNSTAN'S.—It is understood on reliable authority that the work of rebuilding of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, Charlottetown, destroyed by fire on March 8th last, has been put in the hands of a large contracting firm in Montreal, who submitted a tender for the contract. The purpose of the present visit of his Lordship Bishop O'Leary and Rev. Father McLellan to Montreal is in fact in connection with this matter. It is understood that they have gone to complete the arrangements for the contract, and that the work on the Cathedral will be commenced as soon as the contract is signed. As already intimated, it is proposed to build the Cathedral on the original design, and the present walls will not be pulled down and entirely replaced but will be repaired to the necessary extent.

CLOSING EXERCISES.—At 10.30 yesterday morning the pupils of the model School, preparatory to going off on their Summer holidays, gave their usual closing entertainment, at which the diplomas and prizes awarded for the work during the year were distributed. The full honor list was published in yesterday's Guardian. The program submitted at the closing exercises was quite enjoyable, consisting of the following items: Chorus by school—"Hail the King;" recitation, by Douglas Gordon—"My Shadow"; recitation by Jean Mutch, Chorus by School—"Hush thee my Baby;" recitation by Edith Stanley, a doll drill by the primary children; a song by the girls; a dialogue by the boys of Miss Robertson's Dept. Chorus by the school; "fisherman's chorus"; a drill by 12 girls; a chorus by number of boys; recitation by Eleanor Lane. The concluding item of the program, was the appropriate chorus sung by the school "Canada". The National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

STOCK ADVANCED TO SIXTY.

The Mining Record of Denver, which has just come to hand, contains the pleasing announcement that Rochester Hills Mining Company stock is now selling in Reno at sixty cents per share.

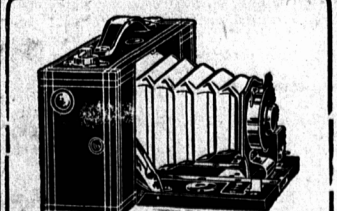
