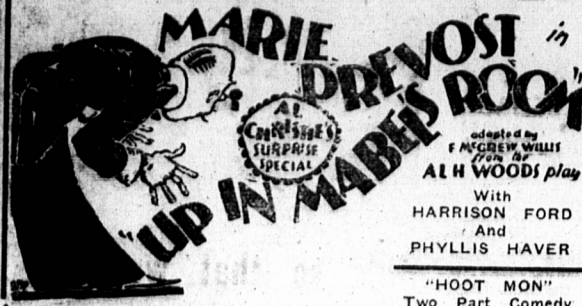

Willie Hoppe Wins Back His Billiard Title

Former Champ Won Out Over German Star by 113 Points.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Willie Hoppe, 39-year-old billiard star, last night won back the world's 28.2 ball line championship by defeating Eric Hagenlacher, 1500 points to 1387.

The final block producing what veteran critics of ball line billiards ever spread before a New York gallery, developed a desperate duel with the tide of battle swinging back and forth on the hinges of sensational runs.

Trailing by 183 caroms after Hoppe had added 23 to an unfinished string of 43 from the second black the champion cut loose with his most brilliant rally of the match, clicking off 385 caroms with machine-like regularity. When he piled up another collection of 105 in the next inning to take a lead of 202, Hoppe appeared distanced.

But the former champion, whose reign extended over a period of almost 17 years before he finally bowed to Jake Shaefer, two years ago, finally overhauled his rival with a spectacular string which exceeded Hagenlacher's best effort.

Hoppe finished in three daring spurts of 286, 129 and 43. Hagenlacher outscored the challenger in last night's last block, 547 to 500, but Hoppe's lead of 160 from the second block combined with his masterful play last night, staved off the closing spurts.

Campbellton Beats Town Hockey Team

EDMUNSTON, Jan. 10.—More than 1,000 fans witnessed the town hockey team take a trimming at the hands of the Campbellton club here last week, in one of the hardest fought games ever witnessed on local ice. The score was 3-2.

Although from start to finish the local boys kept within constant reach of the Campbellton net, the Campbellton goalie proved a barrier. Proulx, the Edmonton goalie, was not in his usual form and found himself rather busy through out the game.

In the last period the Edmonton lads seemed to get the upper hand, and registered two goals in quick succession, but the bell prevented them from entering the tying score. Although the game was one of the fastest ever played here, each side were unanimous in declaring it one of the cleanest games they had so far indulged in.

Larry McLean to Coach Mount A.

SACKVILLE, Jan. 10.—The entire campus of Mount Allison is this week engaged in extending the hearties of welcomes to the veteran hockey coach Larry McLean who has returned again to take over the reins of the Garnett and Gold hockey squad. Despite attractive offers from this club to continue his work there, Larry elected to return to the Garnett and Gold and continue his great work of last winter in turning out a team for Mount Allison. He is recognized as one of the best hockey coaches in the east and last season he produced a team from comparatively green material that turned the tide to the fast U. N. B. sextette.

B. P. Lynch, Boston Sports Editor, Dies

BOSTON, Jan. 10.—Byrney Park Lynch, sports editor of the Boston American, died here Saturday aged 41. He served in the Royal Canadian Air Force for 14 months during the war, and during his service at Beamsville, Ont., where he was an instructor, he crashed twice.

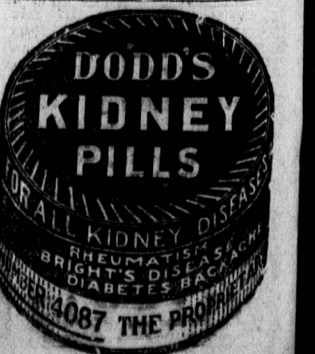
