Salesman Is Held In Child-Kidnapping Case

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 11 — (AP) — Blonde little Janie Franz, four, safe and sound after a night with a strange man, told her Daddy Saturday "I'll never go riding with a stranger again."

The man she said took her in his automobile Friday from her Trenton, N.J., neighborhood was charged with kidnapping and independent assault. He was booked as Gerald A. Hutt, 35, of Bridgeport, Conn., and said he was a brush salesman estranged from his wife and two small children.

Hutt waived extradition and was taken to Trenton where he was arraigned before Police Judge Albert W. Cooper, Jr.

Cooper ordered Hutt held in \$50,000 bail for Grand Jury action on a kidnap charge.

The defendant entered a plea of guilty. Under New Jersey law, maximum punishment for kidnapping is life imprisonment.

Grim Tragedy Stalks Ill-Fated Pleasure Cruise

NANTUCKET ISLAND, Mass., Sept. 11 — (AP) — Nine persons, including five women, were drowned and two men struggled against stormy seas all night to safety after the 36-foot cabin cruiser Constance was smashed to bits late Friday in a raging storm.

One of the survivors saw five members of his family and finally his fiancée die in the tossing waves.

Prepared by C.E.A. committee headed by Dr. M. E. LeZerte, Dean of the Faculty of Education, University of Alberta, the study is a follow-up of the first LeZerte report last year when at the convention in Winnipeg. It is expected to recommend improvements of conditions as found in the earlier one.

Seeking Ten Day Extension

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 — (AP) — A presidential board Saturday rejected a four-hour work day extension for 1,000,000 C. I. O. steelworkers, but recommended a pension-insurance "package" of 10 cents an hour.

The board's fast-finding board's recommendations would avert the walkout, scheduled for 12:01 A.M. Wednesday, was not yet apparent. But President Truman asked at least a 10-day extension of the existing truce.

The board said living costs have declined in the United States and the post-war race between them and wages has been called off by "economic forces."

Estimate Loss At \$50,000

NEWCASTLE, N.B., Sept. 11 — (CP) — Damage was estimated at \$50,000 after fire destroyed three houses and two barns at nearby South Nelson Saturday afternoon.

Firemen from Newcastle, Chatham and other communities fought the fire for three and a half hours before bringing it under control. At one time the entire lumbermill village was threatened.

Two of the last houses were owned and occupied by Mrs. Martin English and Michael McCarthy. The other, former home of Dr. R. J. Dolan, was unoccupied. The barns were owned by Mrs. English and J. Leonard O'Brien.

Arizona Ranch Girl Is New "Miss America"

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., Sept. 11 — (CP) — A dark-haired, 18-year-old Arizona ranch girl who would rather go trout fishing and play golf than ride a horse is the new "Miss America."

To the cheers of 22,000 spectators who jammed Convention Hall, Jacqueline Mercer of Litchfield, Ariz., was selected Saturday night as "Miss America of 1949." She won a \$5,000 scholarship, a \$2,000 automobile and numerous contracts for personal appearances.

Rail System Faces Threat Of "Go Slow" Movement

LONDON, Sept. 11 — (CP) — Threats of a "go slow" movement that could develop into a country-wide strike face Britain's nationalized railway system.

The situation has been tense since last week when an arbitration board flatly rejected the claim for 10 shillings (\$2) a week more pay.

Another body, made up of 27,000 workers endorsed tonight a resolution saying they cannot be responsible for the reaction of union members to the Board's decision, which had "shocked" the N.U.R.'s Manchester Council.

Bodies Of Crash Victims Removed From Wreckage

SAULT AU COCHON, Sept. 11 — (CP) — Bodies of 21 aircraft victims were sent to Quebec City today by special train while search parties continued to look for one passenger of an ill-fated Canadian Pacific Airlines DC-3 which plunged into a high St. Lawrence north shore Cape Friday morning, killing 23 persons.

Another body, found today in the wreckage of the plane, is at St. Joachim, 16 miles from this shoreline flag stop. It will be taken to Quebec later by train.

No Sign Of Settlement

QUEBEC, Sept. 11 — (CP) — Settlement of the four-day strike was not in sight early tonight as weary Quebecers walked.

The strike started Thursday afternoon when 122 garagemen employed by the Quebec Railway Light and Power Company walked off their jobs for higher salaries. The men serviced the transportation company's 187 buses.

Negotiations were reported to be proceeding at a slow pace under the guidance of Liguori Pepin, Federal Labor Department conciliator.

Britain also is believed ready to turn to the International Monetary Fund for direct loans to supplement these limited trade controls.

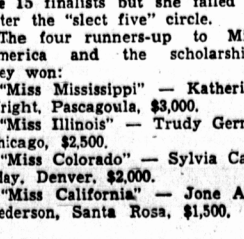

Agreement On Dollar Aid To Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 — (AP) — Britain, the United States and Canada announced Saturday they will try to top Wall Street and two big government banks for some of the dollars Britain needs to break its economic crisis.

As stated officially, the three governments agreed to seek removal of obstacles to foreign investment of private capital, to encourage loan requests to the world bank and the United States export-import bank.

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
