**PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION, INTRODUCED.**

HALIFAX, March 31.—A resolution has been passed here asking that Provincial Prohibition be introduced in the Legislature. The resolution not only asks prohibition but that the Local Government shall seek to obtain from the Federal Parliament the enactment of such legislation as will prohibit the manufacture of liquors within, and the importation of liquors into the province.

The Rev. Mr. Cooper, the Baptist Liberal member of the Alliance, will oppose, holding that the present laws secure better results.

## ANNUAL CONVENTION HELD AT ST. JOHN

(By W. S. Louson.)

Eloquent and inspiring addresses were delivered at the recent convention of the Canadian Bible Society at St. John, N. B. As the Prince Edward Island Bible Society is a branch of this society and auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society a few lines at this time will doubtless be of interest.

Prince Edward Island Branch contributed \$500.00 last year, and is expected this year to give six hundred dollars.

A magnificent address was given by the Rev. R. J. Bowen of Vancouver, B. C. showing the great need of the North West and British Columbia for more Bibles and workers.

If all the pressing needs of Canada are to be met especially of our foreign population a larger increase is very necessary. Eleven thousand more Bibles were distributed last year in the Dominion than the previous year, 19,000 copies were distributed at the port of St. John, N. B., to emigrants, translated into their own native language, 90,000 copies of the Bible were distributed in Canada during last year. It may be of interest to know that the parent society printed 600,000 copies of Bible last year.

For Canada the Bible is printed in over eighty different languages. On one page is printed the English, and on the opposite page the translation, under these circumstances what an educator, and uplifter the word of God becomes to those who come to Canada from foreign shores.

Rev. E. Hill, D.D., Montreal, said, that men and women today are standing in the masters place, and should help all they can in assisting the work of the Bible Society.

Mayor Bullock welcomed the delegates to St. John and said in part that the Bible has been the book of all ages and will be "The Book" of the 20th century.

W. S. Fisher, President of Board of Trade said a Christian should always be an optimist that the Board of Trade stood for good citizenship, and the Bible stood for the same. Trade has been said to follow the flag. It surely follows the Bible. The countries with the open bible were the greatest producers. The Laymen's Missionary Movement showed that business men were taking greater interest in religious matters.

Rev. W. Shaw D.D., L.L.D., Montreal replying to Mayor Bullock, and Board of Trade, said that the Bible Society delegates came with a message of peace and good will to all. This city is known to be friendly towards our cause, but "the speaker said I have heard the Bible was not so extensively read in Halifax, because there were so much about, St. John in it." This bright passage, caused much laughter by all present.

The Rev. W. R. Young, in a very forcible address on the Bible Society, said that the 20th century belonged to Canada, but to whom would Canada belong at the close.

present generation, was to succeed the work of the Bible Society must receive a greater impetus.

The Rev. W. B. Cooper the General Secretary of the Canadian Branch of Bible Society gave out a number of interesting facts and figures.

During the year 148,000 emigrants arrived, among whom the Society has carried on active work. The finances of the Society are in a very satisfactory condition, contributions from almost every section having been increased. The total revenue amounted to \$66,436.36.

In closing his address the Rev. Mr. Cooper urged the immediate necessity of grappling with the problem of emigration. Above all else it is in Canada, the question of the Hour. It demands the attention of every public minded citizen in the country. "I need not remind you of the necessity of Biblical influence on our natural life. It is, or should be, the foundation.

This became public today through the discovery of the files in the case. Louis F. Swift, a brother, testified that Herbert Swift had threatened to kill himself and members of the family. Excessive use of alcohol is given as the cause.
