Pictures Of Jasper
Shown At Gyros

Showing of motion pictures made by Hamilton Jones, noted cameraman, was given at the Gyro Club meeting last evening at "The Hotel Charlottetown." This film won Mr. Jones the award of the Amateur Cinema League, the Hiram Percy Maxim Trophy for the best amateur film produced in 1937. Mr. Jones spent last summer in Jasper Park and secured a number of pictures making some 10,000 feet of color film, with which he has enlarged his original prize winning entry.

The Jasper Park picture, which includes also some Mt. Robson park scenes, won the international trophy in competition with 2000 entries from photographers in Europe, Asia, Australia and both Americas. It has been shown and highly commended in many of the large centres of this continent and proved an effective advertisement of Jasper scenic attractions.

This picture comes to Charlottetown under Canadian National Railway auspices.

HOBBIES SHOW OPENS AT 'Y' LAST NIGHT

Is Supporter Of Compulsory Military Service

Any idea that compulsory military training was "un-English or un-Canadian" was wrong, Major T. E. McNutt, Charlottetown, said yesterday when speaking before the Charlottetown Rotary Club.

Before confederation, Nova Scotia through compulsory military service, trained more men for war than Canada did today, he said. Compulsory training was ancient. In the book of numbers "we find that the Lord commanded Moses in the wilderness to number the males from 20 years upward who were able to go forth to war in Israel."

It was not un-English, "for previous to the Norman conquest every freeman from 15 to 60 was bound to serve as the King's soldier. The battles of Cressy, Poitiers and Agincourt were won by men trained to die as part of their duty of citizenship," Major McNutt said.

The system was not un-Canadian. The first militia organized in Quebec in 1649 for defence against the Indians was compulsory. An act passed in 1808 by both lower and upper Canada compelled all men between 16 and 60 to serve. In the Maritimes the principle of compulsory service prevailed until confederation "although its enforcement had by that time become more or less of a farce."

Commenting on the Canadian voluntary military service of today, Major McNutt quoted Lord Roberts: "No modification of the voluntary system, no amount of lavish expenditure, no costly, no higgling of figures will ever produce an adequate and efficient home army on the voluntary system."

If Canada was to have an efficient defence force, he said its youth should be trained for a period of six months upon reaching a certain age and shorter periods during the following years. An act passed in 1808 by both lower and upper Canada compelled all men between 16 and 60 to serve. In the Maritimes the principle of compulsory service prevailed until confederation "although its enforcement had by that time become more or less of a farce."

Besides the two candidates, the speakers included Messrs. Walter Burdette, W. H. Waterworth, Malcolm MacLeod and Joseph Kennedy.
