Those who have a care for the welfare of the Island are strongly opposed to such a scheme. It could not possibly bring us anything which we do not already possess. It would not open a market to us for a pound weight of anything we produce. But it would be an effective method of closing the markets in many cases of the adjoining provinces. They are larger in area than we are and would necessarily have far larger representatives. Our Province, now its own master, free and prosperous, would become a mere hunting ground for every kind of rascal. We would be noted, and the public positions which now rightfully belong to native Islanders in large measure would become a rich pasture for people sent here to overstock us. As we have so much of that under the Confederation as we can stand and more than the proportion of positions allotted to us in the rest of Canada. As an example of the treatment some times accorded to Islanders it is only necessary to cite the injustice meted out to Island-born teachers when it was ordered by the authorities of Saskatchewan that the practice of teaching Island teachers shall be discontinued while the same practice towards all other provinces shall be continued. There is no reason to suppose that where opportunity offers that selfishness would not be also dominant in the proposed Maritime Union. We have not found it utterly absent in the prices of Coal and other commodities purchased across the strait by us. Nor did we ever find it so. Where our railway was being built the rights under our present independent system that are a priceless inheritance, and should never be bartered away. We pay our own expenses in respect to the cost of legislation which seems to be a heavy burden on us in the hands of our outside benefactors—we ask them for nothing—why then are they busying themselves about our affairs? Indeed, we would be better employed in discussing the enormous snatches of territory in the acquisition of a territory than in discussing the surrender of the limited territory we now possess. Let
