THE QUEBEC DISASTER.

The fall of the great bridge in course of erection at Quebec, causing the loss of scores of precious lives, an enormous property loss and setting back the completion of a most important work may be called a national disaster.

There is no bridge across the St. Lawrence below Montreal, and hence all south bound traffic from Quebec City and for distances east and west by rail had to be ferried across the river to Levis.

The original estimated cost was \$3,500,000, but this was soon found to be far within the mark. At the outset a subsidy of a million dollars was secured from the Dominion Government, \$350,000 from the Provincial Government and \$300,000 from the City of Quebec.

In any case the Quebec bridge was to be an exceedingly costly work and the loss caused by the collapse will greatly increase it, while delaying the completion of the work by probably a year or more.

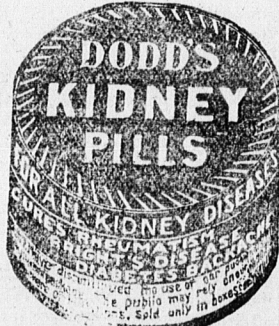
It was on the south, or Levis side of the river, where the work was most advanced that the collapse occurred. All the piers were ready for the entire superstructure of the bridge, and on the south side the approach span of 230 feet and the anchor span of 500 feet had been erected, and some 20 feet of the connecting spans between the cantilevers.

It is the nature of cantilever bridge work that the extensions beyond the sup-

porting piers are exposed to very great strain until the work is completed across, when all portions become mutually assisting. It was this that caused the collapse. The boldness of the undertaking, the skill with which great difficulties were being overcome, the great importance of the bridge to the railway traffic of the future, and now the frightful loss of life together with the heavy property loss, makes the disaster one of the most appalling and regrettable that has yet occurred in the Dominion.

The Intercolonial Railway is doing well at present. In the year ended with June last a surplus of \$100,000 was rolled up. This follows a surplus of \$80,000 the year before. Back of that lie the big deficits of \$1,750,000 in 1905 and \$900,000 in 1904. Most earnestly it is to be hoped that the good record of the past two years may be continued and extended.

T. Nasse, Japanese Consul General at Ottawa, has given to the press a statement setting forth that of 2,033 Japanese arriving at British Columbia ports during the first six months of the current year all but 641 were mere students, transient visitors or immigrants on route or returning to the United States.
