GIVEN CHARGE OF POST OFFICES WASHINGTON, Sept. 8- Since Miss Nellie Dougherty was named by the new Roosevelt Administration last March 9 as acting postmaster of Minot, North Dakota, 369 women have been given charge of the mails in their home towns. They're not "postmistresses," postal officials stress. Each one has the same title a man would have on the job-"post master" with the prefix "acting" because all are recess appointments, subject to confirmation by the next congress. In compiling the total today, the Post Office Department also established that 14 of the 369 have been appointed to head first class post offices. Miss Lavinia Engle, one of the women leaders of the Democratic campaign, expressed keen satisfaction in the progress of this particular form of political recognition for women. "It shows that party leaders are aware of the hard work that is being done by women in their own communities," she said. "I expect a good many more such appointments." Mrs. Hattie Caraway, lone feminine senator, who is said to get more mail from "back home" than any other senator, now boasts a woman postmaster in her home city of Jonesboro, Arkansas. At Bluefield, W. Va., another first class post office, Mrs. Stella M. Bivens was appointed in recognition of the political work done by her husband, who was slated for the position but died. PRAIRIE SOIL SUPERIORITY The essential or distinguishing characteristic of the Western prairie soils is the possession of a large proportion of vegetable matter and its concomitant nitrogen. It is to this fact unquestionably says the Dominion Chemist, that these soils primarily owe their remarkable fertility and lasting quality. For the most part, they certainly contain abundant stores of the mineral elements of plant food, but in this respect they do not suffer from many soils of less productivity in other parts of the Dominion. It is the larger percentage of nitrogen-holding humus forming material and its intimate corporation with the sand and clay that give to these soils their superiority, chemically, physically and biologically. Lastly, there is the winter with its intense cold practically locking up the stores of plant food from the autumn until the season opens again. Waste from leaching, such as occurs in countries in which the winter is mild and open is thus prevented. PRACTICAL HOG RAISING Following the recommendations of the Live Stock Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, the following practical results in hog-raising were obtained by Mr. A. Campbell, Reston, Manitoba: Litter of 12 pigs weighing 2,690 lbs. at \$4 per cwt. \$107.60; 12 selects at \$1 each, \$12-value of litter \$119.60. Costs-barley 5,588 lbs. at 30c per bushel, \$34.92; oats, 816 lbs. at 25c per bushel, \$6; wheat 720 lbs. at 50c per bushel \$6; milk 14,400 lbs. at 10c per cwt. \$14.40. Feed costs \$61.32; marketing 2,690 lbs. at 65c per cwt. \$17.48; total cost \$78.80. Profit on 12 hogs \$40.80; profit per hog \$3.40. WINTERING THE GLADIOLUS CORMS In the autumn when gladiolus corms are being harvested, says G. Dusan of the Dominion Entomological Branch, they should be given special attention to safeguard them from the invasion of thrips. The tips should be cut off as near the corm as possible and the corms should be removed immediately from the field to a place where there is no danger of infestation. They can be dried there and then placed in storage. If at all possible the corms should be stored in a cellar or building where the temperature can be kept down as low as 40 degrees F. This is most important. If the temperature is much higher, feeding and development of the thrips will continue through the winter and injury to the corms result. The gladiolus bed should be dug up or ploughed in the late fall, thus exposing any thrips which may be overwintering there. Club Expert-Your trouble is that you don't address the ball properly.
