Contract Bridge

Brilliant Defense

The presence of a singleton in dummy, or the suspected presence of the same in a declarer's hand, often acts as a trap for the average defender. Terence Reese, a prominent English player, shows how an expert reacts to the threat of a singleton using this deal as a striking illustration.

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

♠ A 4 3
♥ K 5 2
♦ 6
♣ A J 10 8 5 4

♠ 9 8 5
♥ A 9 8 3

The bidding:
South West North East
1♠ Pass 2♣ Pass
2♦ Pass 2NT Pass
3♠ Pass 4♣ Pass

West's opening lead was the queen of hearts. The king was put up, East won and continued the suit, South ruffing the third round. South then lead the diamond king—and West ducked!

The excellence of this play by West can only be fully revealed when we consider what an easy time the declarer would have if West took the diamond king with his ace. Declarer could then control any lead West made, draw all the trumps and run his entire diamond suit.

But after West's hold-up of the diamond ace, the defenders could find a way to defeat the contract, despite South's best efforts. South next led the diamond queen, and West ducked again. He followed the same procedure when the diamond jack was led, and now East ruffed—dummy having discarded clubs on the second and third rounds of diamonds.

At this point, East made the clever return of his last heart—a properly disregarding the fact that both declarer and dummy were out of the suit. This made South's position utterly hopeless—whether he ruffed the heart in his own hand or in dummy's, he could not avoid the loss of the setting trick. West's duck of the diamond king is commended to readers' attention.
