DR. THOMAS TROTTER, president of Acadia University, in writing to a friend says he expects the second Rockefeller movement in the college finances will result successfully by the first of 1906. This means that \$100,000 will have been raised to secure an equal amount from the renowned John D. At present Rev. H. F. Adams and Rev. W. L. Archibald are diligently canvassing the denomination in behalf of the fund, and report much encouragement—so much so, in fact, that a few more weeks may bring the end of the big task in sight. One of the notable features of the contributing is that New Brunswick Free Baptists—or rather those who were known as Free Baptists a short time ago—are giving willingly and in substantial sums. This is doubly appreciated as it signifies union of interests in very truth among Baptists of this section of Canada. If the whole of the \$100,000 are not raised by the university, Mr. Rockefeller will diminish his gift accordingly. In other words, he gives dollar for dollar. However, the collectors are not going to relax their efforts until the whole sum is realized.

The Provincial Execution Board of the P. E. I. Lord's Day Alliance was in session yesterday afternoon, the President Rev. Neil McLaughlin in the chair. There were also present Rev. J. G. Shearer, General Secy. for the Dominion, Rev. R. G. Strathie, Provincial Secretary; Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rev. James Simpson, Rev. G. R. White, Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, A. W. Sterns, W. T. Huggan, J. T. Mellish, Senator Robertson, Montague, and The Secretary reported that two new branches had been organized during the year, one at Malpeque and one at New London North. The treasurer reported the receipts \$109, the disbursements \$132. The General Secretary reported on the work throughout the Dominion. There are now 600 local societies, with an enrolled membership of 300, the monthly organ the Lord's Day Advocate has a circulation of 35000 and a new secretary for the four western provinces is being appointed. Application is being made to Parliament for the enactment of a Dominion Lord's Day Act a draft of which will be published in The Guardian columns shortly. Petitions are to be circulated shortly asking for this legislation and the local board have arranged for the a thorough canvass of all the electors of the Province. Steps were taken to increase the number of branches in the Island.
