Weather conditions are now ideal for plant growth. The mild warm rains and balmy air have an invigorating effect on the soil and field and grove are changing their sombre hue for a rich garb of green. Farming operations are well advanced in this vicinity. Many farmers in this section of country have been applying a coating of crushed lime to their cultivated fields and hay lands which we believe will result in improved crops especially that of hay. This latter crop seemed to have retrograded during the years of the potato bonanza.

The Schr. Hazel B. Millar, Capt. Sidney Munn, Murray River, has been discharging fertilizer for the Potato Growers Association at Greek River wharf.

Reports of the lobster fishing industry this season does not exceed that of former years, especially around the eastern and southern coast waters, while the catch off the North Shore is reported excellent.

**Round World Flight In A Monoplane**

 SPRINGFIELD, MASS.—May 31.—Lieutenant Frank J. Lynch of Summit, N. J., who describes himself as a former war-time flying instructor at San Diego and a former movie stunt pilot, today announced details of a 40,000 mile round-the-world flight in a monoplane now nearing completion here. Lynch said he will make the tour with his wife, the former Josephine McKee of St. Paul, Minn.

Their plane is a high wing monoplane and will have a cruising speed of 175 miles an hour, and a top of 210.

Lynch said he and Mrs. Lynch plan to start from the Newark, N. J. Airport as soon as tests of his plane are completed and go westward to the Pacific Coast. The couple will then fly north to Nome, and will cross to Siberia by way of Bering Strait, going to Vladivostok. Continuing Southward, they plan to cross the Malay Peninsula, and then hop over water to Australia. From Australia they will follow the trail of Bert Hinkler, Amy Johnson and Wing Commander Kingsford Smith to England and then make their way to Canada and back to New York by way of Iceland, Greenland and Cochrane, Ont.

**Murder And Suicide In Summer Camp**

ALTON, N. H., May 31.—An autopsy on the bodies of Helen Luscomb, 26, of Lawrence, Mass., and William Foster, 34, of Andover, Mass., found in a summer camp near here Sunday today disclosed, police said that the woman apparently had shot her companion and then committed suicide, presumably after both had taken poison.

Both Foster, who was married and the father of three children, and Mrs. Luscomb, whose mother said she had been friendly with Foster, had been missing three weeks and police said the bodies apparently had been in the camp during that time.

**Reduce Gold In Peruvian Currency**

LIMA, PERU, May 31.—(AP)—Three mills designed to ease Peru's financial condition by lowering the gold backing of the sol, establishing a national budget commission and reducing the capital of the central reserve bank here passed today.

Under one measure the gold back of the Peruvian currency would be reduced from about 98 percent to 50 percent. With a corresponding increase in the silver and marketable paper backing, permitting the reserve bank to increase the national currency from 38,000,000 soles to 76,000,000 soles. (The par value of the sol is 28 cents but the current quotation on foreign exchanges is 25 cents.)

**U. S. Not Interested In Lausanne Conference**

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Premier Ramsay MacDonald's plea that the Lausanne reparations conference on June 16 be turned into a General conference on world trade was said today by the United States state department to have left unshaken the determination of this country to remain away from Lausanne.

The United States has never been asked to attend the Lausanne gathering, and if it were asked, state department officials said, it would not send delegates. This Government has held since President Wilson's time that the United States asked no reparations from Germany and is therefore not concerned about reparations.

After the European powers have reached some agreement on reparations and intergovernmental debts, the United States will consider proposals foreign countries may care to make concerning the debts they owe this country.

In his recent visit to the disarmament conference at Geneva, Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of State, refrained from discussing the reparations and inter-governmental debt problem and the state department says he has not discussed this problem by Trans-Atlantic telephone or cable since his return from Europe.

**Must Go After The Business Says Col. Price**

MONTREAL, May 30.—(By the Canadian Press)—Aggressive salesmanship in the British West Indies is necessary if Canada is to compete successfully with the United States, Col. W. H. Price, Ontario Attorney General, declared today. Col. Price arrived from Jamaica late last night and will reach Toronto tonight. He returned from his brief holiday much improved in health.

"Sentiment is in favor of Canada, but we have to go after business in more determined fashion. We have to fight for it," Mr. Price said. He did not think there was any possibility of Canada ever taking over control of the British West Indian colonies.
