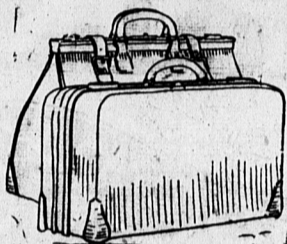

One brother and one sister survive him, Ernest at the old home Uigg and Flora, wife of Mr. Geo. J. Johnson of Lorne Valley.

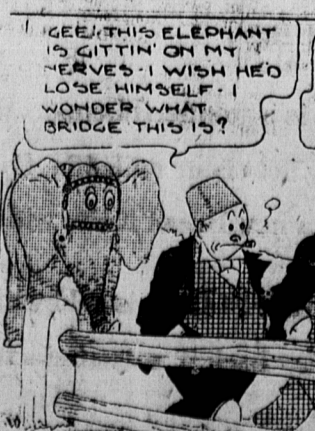
Mr. Shaw was born October 18th 1879 and at time of his death was 47 years 9 months and 12 days.

Edison Has A Jubilee

LLEWELLYN PARK, N. J., Aug. 16.—The phonograph reached its golden anniversary today and 250 guests assembled on the front lawn of Thomas A. Edison's home to honor the half-century of life attained by his favorite invention.

Edison, 30 years older than the instrument which first captured and reproduced sound, smilingly accepted the tributes of his friends and public speech.

Talking into a microphone of the radio, a mere upstart in this business of sound transmission, Edison recited "Mary Had a Little Lamb." It was that bit of verse about the lamb whose fleece was as white as is the hair on the inventor's head which Edison spoke into the transmitter of the first phonograph, 50 years ago.

Edison appeared a little uncertain as he "said his piece." He may have been wishing he could turn a little gadget, adjust earphones and hear his voice come back to him as it did in 1877.

Sport Notes

KEATING WILL GIVE YOUNG A RACE

That should be quite a race at Toronto.

George Young, the Canadian youngster, will be in a tough spot, for it will be up to him to show the home folks that his victory at Catalina was not a flash in the pan.

If Keating, the New York youngster, enters, Young will have plenty of competition. This fellow Keating learned to swim in Sheepshead Bay, and specialized in shorter distances in his aquatic apprenticeship. He developed tremendous speed at shorter distance in addition to endurance. The combination of sprinting power and endurance makes him a tough bird to beat in a 26-mile swim.

Most of these marathoners of the sea are strictly "stayers." That is they enter a swim determined to stick it out if it takes all summer. They plod along patiently, not overmuch concerned with the time they make so long as they get to the end. Keating is poison to those fellows. He gets out and kills them off in the first ten miles by sprinting at a furious pace.

At Lake George he took the heart out of Vierkoetter, the German by sheer speed. He came from behind at the eighth mile, reached the German's collar and then raced him ragged. Vierkoetter tried to match the youngster's pace but dropped out of the race when he found that he couldn't do it. Swimming experts are interested in learning whether Keating can do the same to George Young.

WORLD'S RECORD

Callie Direct, black gelding, by Col. Armstrong, owned by Frank Calahan, Tiffin, Ohio, business man and sportsman, and driven by Vic Fleming, of North Randall, won the 2,000 pace, third and feature event on Saturday's Grand Circuit program here, in straight heats, taking a good field into camp, including Dr. Volo, heat winner in the \$25,000 American Pacing Derby at Kalamazoo. Just before the races started S. E. Phalin, Indianapolis, reinsman, drove Red Pluto a mile in 2:05 3-4 against time, said to be a new world's record for two-year-old pacers.

LONDON SHOCKED BY H. R. H. WEARING HARD STRAW HAT

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Fashionable London has been shocked by photographs showing the Prince of Wales in Canada wearing a hard straw hat.

For forty years this hasn't been done in polite British circles. Only Harrow school boys, Smithfield meat porters and tourists now wear straw hats, but since the Prince of Wales has donned one Bond street and Piccadilly fashion experts are wondering whether soft felts will make way for straws next summer.

"Yellow Beak" To Peck Mussolini

(By British United Press) PARIS, August 17.—In a few weeks' time the journal which used to have the biggest circulation in Italy will reappear in Paris.

It is "Il Becco Giallo" (The Yellow Beak), which up to a couple of years ago was published in Rome. The paper had a style of its own; its gay humour, quick wit, biting sarcasm and telling irony kept all Italy amused.

But eventually Signor Mussolini and his blackshirts failed to appreciate its humour and objected to its sarcasm; so it was definitely suppressed.

It will appear thrice monthly in Paris, and will be edited by two of the most eminent of Italian journalists—Signor Alberto Gianca and Signor Alberto Giannini.

Signor Gianca was for many years the editor of the once great Rome newspaper "Il Messaggero," and later director of two democratic journals, "Il Mondo" and "Il Risorgimento," both suppressed by Fascism.

Signor Giannini was political editor of "Il Paese," also suppressed, and founder and director of "Il Becco Giallo."

Both journalists had to flee from Italy. "Il Becco Giallo" in its new form will play a leading part in the extraordinary secret Press campaign being waged against Fascism.

Now that the Press in Italy has been completely gagged, an "underground Press" has come into existence in Rome, Milan, Turin and Naples.

The secretly printed newspapers which find their way all over Italy are giving the blackshirt authorities a very great deal of trouble, but so far none of these hidden newspaper offices has been discovered.

"Il Becco Giallo" will not be on sale; it will only be sent to subscribers—and others.

It will not, of course, have open subscribers in Italy, but means will be adopted to deliver it secretly throughout that country.

To subscribers in other countries the appeal will be made to send their copies to Italy, taking care not to address them to any anti-Fascist already being persecuted by the authorities.

Its format will enable it to go easily by post—in an envelope like a letter, in a foreign newspaper favourable to Fascism, in a catalogue, a trade circular and scientific review.

The editors believe it will be impossible for the Italian authorities to censor all postal packets.

The staff of the paper will consist of a number of well-known Italian writers and journalists willing to sink all differences of opinion in the common struggle against Fascism.

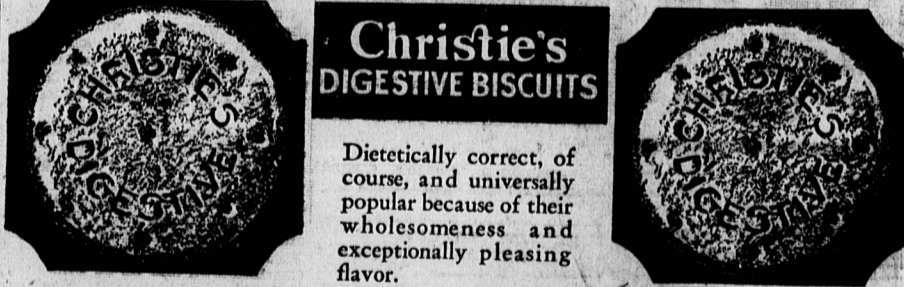
