## A SAMPLE OF IRISH EVICTION.

Extraordinary scenes of lawlessness took place recently at the eviction of Edmund Murphy, who held a large house and 100 acres of land on the Bell estate at Watnaghassill, situated between Cork and Mallow. Murphy, who owed six years' rent, expected a few shillings and with his friends he made extensive preparations to resist the entrance of the bailiffs. The house was fortified as for a siege. Trunks of trees were piled outside the doors and windows, which were barricaded inside with iron gates, barbed wire fencing, and other obstacles. The tenant and twenty other neighbors, who were armed with scythes, crowbars and pitchforks, shut themselves in and awaited the arrival of the sheriff's party. Outside Messrs. E. Crean, M.P., D. D. Sheehan, M. P., and other Nationalists, accompanied by a brass band, harangued a large crowd at intervals. However, there was no sign of the sheriff's coming, and the crowd dispersed at nightfall, leaving the farmstead in possession of its garrison.

At 9 o'clock next morning Mr. John Gale, county sub-sheriff, and a number of bailiffs, protected by a large force of constabulary, under District Inspector Webster, appeared in front of the house and set about taking possession. When an attempt was made to force one of the doors the police and bailiffs were deluged with boiling water and pelted with paving stones by the occupants, and after a desperate scene the officers were obliged to retire and despatch couriers to Cork for reinforcements and a battering ram. These arrived a few hours later, their passage to the scene of the eviction being blooded at several points by tree trunks thrown across the roadway. Ardncarter Bridge was practically fortified and held by an immense crowd, and it took the constabulary nearly an hour to clear a passage. At 2.30 the Cork force of fifty constables joined the Fermoy force outside Murphy's dwelling, and the large hostile crowd which filled the farmyard had to be ejected by the force of police, using their rifle butts. A head constable and some men armed with crowbars advanced towards the house, when they were received with a fusillade of missiles from the upper windows. Dodging bottles, bricks, and so forth as well as they could, half-a-dozen constables forced an entrance into a stable which adjoins the main building and began to demolish the gable wall, but they made slow progress and at 4.30 other tactics were tried. A score of policemen stood in a line in front of the house, and hurled volley after volley of stones at the windows, and under cover of this fire a similar number got their battering-ram at work on the front door, and after half an hour's work the front door was smashed to atoms, revealing the defenders still protected by iron gates. An order was given to draw bayonets, but the defenders, who seemed in a frenzy, replied with iron bars, and so forth as well as did not deem it prudent to continue the conflict further at this point, or there certainly would have been bloodshed.

In the melee several of the policemen were struck with missiles, and one was felled to the ground. One had his nose broken, another had all his front teeth knocked out and several others were cut and slashed or bruised. The constabulary, then, using a large wooden gate as a shield, advanced again to the door, and after encountering much boiling water, they gained an entrance to the ground floor, to find that the occupants had retired upstairs and strongly barricaded the staircase. One of the defenders (Lawrence Flaherty) was captured and placed under arrest. At this juncture District Inspector Webster (Middleton) approached Messrs. Crean and Sheehan and asked them to prevail upon the men inside the house to surrender, and Mr. Crean replied that he was most anxious to do so on honorable terms. After the strong protest that had been made, he wanted to prevent loss of life. There was a cessation of some hours, during which frequent parleys were held.

At length the men surrendered, and the police made twenty arrests. The prisoners were taken under a strong guard before a magistrate at Watnaghassill and remanded. The police force and bailiffs then returned to their different stations, leaving a body to guard over the farmstead.

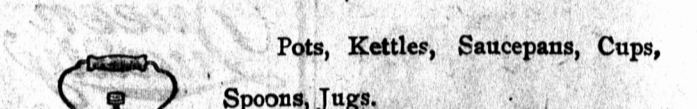
