**CHARTER TRIP**—Three passengers and 150 pounds of mail were taken on a charter trip to the Magdalen Islands yesterday by Capt. Carl Burke of Maritime Central Airways. The plane left here at 6:30 a.m. and was back at 11:15. The mail for the Gulf Islands was the last for there in the local post office at present. Messrs. A. J. MacDonald, L. W. Wonnacott and Joseph Dougan of the Charlottetown Post Office staff accompanied Capt. Burke on the flight.

**MEMBERS ENJOY PLANE RIDE**—Members of the Prince Edward Island Legislature left their desks long enough yesterday afternoon to enjoy a plane ride with Maritime Central Airways. The invitation of the Airways Company issued to the General Assembly was accepted by 18 of the members, who had a pleasant half hour ride. This is the first time in the history of the province that the Legislators had the privilege of going "up in the air" in a body. The first flight was made at 3:45 with Capt. Carl Burke at the controls of the Barkley-Grove aircraft used on the two trips carried out. Eight members and their wives accompanied the flight on the first flight and the remaining eight on the second. The plane, on both occasions, circled the city and flew over the western part of the province as far as Borden. The politicians were quite air minded when they landed.

**YARN SITUATION SERIOUS**—Mrs. E. A. Foster, Chairman of the Red Cross Women's War Work Committee for this Province, has just received a letter from Mrs. W. R. Campbell, National Chairman of this Committee outlining the quota of knitted goods to be made up in Prince Edward Island during the next eight months. Due to the fact that the yarn situation is becoming quite serious it has been found necessary to stipulate the specific articles which are to be made from the yarn available and there must be no deviation from these instructions. This will necessitate the making up of quotas for the different branches and working groups in this Province so no yarn will be given out or sent out from the Society's Headquarters in Charlottetown until the allocations have been made up which will not be until after April 15th.

**SPEAKS ON AUSTRALIA**—Lac. R. E. Latham, R.A.F., a native of Melbourne, Australia, delivered an interesting address on "Australia and Australians" at the Rotary luncheon yesterday. Messrs. Hubert Morris and J. E. Richardson were joint chairmen. Guests included: Prof. John Inch, Pilot Officer Lvo, AC Edgar and AC Dennett of the R. A. F. Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, A. J. Haslam, Graham Rogers, E. Stewart Jones, Dr. H. H. Pierce, H. E. Paynter of Ottawa, Andrew McNeil, Kenneth Franklin, and Lt. M. G. McCarthy of H.M.C.S. Charlotte. On a suggestion from the Directors it was moved by Hon. Dr. Morris and seconded by Dr. H. H. Shaw and agreed that three shields be donated to the "Queen Charlotte" establishment to be completed for a training period in Gunnery, Seamanship and General Efficiency respectively. Lieut. McCarty, thanked the Club on behalf of the "Ship" and personally the following officers were nominated for the coming year:—President, R. H. Rogers; Vice-President, T. W. L. Prowse; Secretary, W. R. LePage; Treasurer, A. R. MacPherson; Directors, Messrs. T. G. Ives, D. J. Bonnell and Ian Burnett.

**Questions asked in Legislature**

4. Does the Government now own the said Creamery outright, and if not, give the names of all other persons interested therein?

Answers:  
(1) The West Prince Dairy & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., was taken over by the Government on a rental basis of \$2,000 per year.  
(2) The Government has agreed to pay as per question No. 1, \$2,000 per year.  
(3) West Prince Dairy and Cold Storage Co., Ltd.  
(4) The Government does not own the above Creamery outright. It is impossible for me to give the

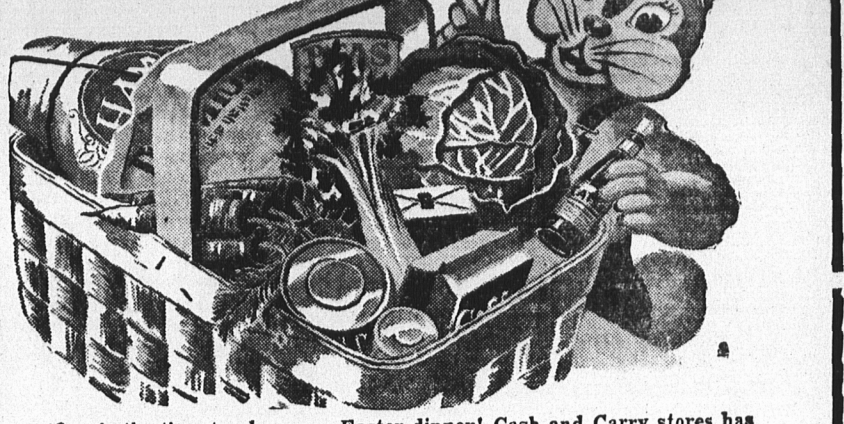
