JUDGE McDONALD.

By announcement already made it transpires that Attorney General McDonald has been appointed to the vacant County Court Judgeship for Queens. The position had been vacant for nearly three months, there being apparently, as is not unusual, some difficulty in making a choice that would satisfy all parties and suit the political exigencies, but that feature of the case may now be relegated to the past without further comment. The main thing is that the appointment is a good one and the delay is now over. THE GUARDIAN has therefore much pleasure in congratulating Judge McDonald upon his appointment, and in expressing approval of the choice the Government have made.

Undoubtedly Mr. McDonald's claims to the position were stronger than those of any other applicant, on various grounds. As Attorney General he was in the direct line of promotion. He had been an active and influential member of his party during a fairly lengthened term of service in the Assembly, he had been a successful practitioner at the bar and he had shown himself to possess in large measure those qualities of mind and heart which commend a public man to the liking of his fellow representatives, not of his own party alone, but of all parties.

This journal has not been able at all times to agree with the measures which during his political career Mr. McDonald had been associated, but we believe he will be found a capable and impartial Judge, whose conduct in that responsible position will fully justify the selection made by the government. Judge McDonald has attained his position as head of our most important County Court at a comparatively early age. His appointment meets with general public approbation and we trust he may long be spared to discharge the responsible and honorable duties to which he has now been called.

Otawa has tried the Sunday cars for Two Sundays now, with the result that the traffic at the first trial was disappointing to the company, and on the second Sunday it was considerably less. The novelty had worn off a little.

It is always pretty warm in the Transvaal, but July and August are winter months down there. And that was rather a cooling resolution for Oom Paul that the Canadian Parliament passed the other day. P. contribute \$10 each, while the Benevolent Irish Society of Charlottetown gave \$150 and the branch of the B. I. S. at Emerald adds \$100. The subscriptions so far toward this worthy object make a total of \$391.50.

On Sunday evening, a number of the members of St. Peter's Cathedral waited upon Mr. R. M. Young in the Sacristy after the service. The address was read by Mr. F. de St. C. Brecken, who alluded in feeling terms to Mr. Young's services in connection with the church. The address was accompanied by a beautiful watch and chain. Mr. Young although taken by surprise made a suitable reply, thanking the donors for the kind address and accompanying aid taken of appreciation.
