TO IMPROVE SHIPPING FACILITIES

Summerside Board of Trade Also Discusses Promoting Fox Show.

Railway shipping facilities, a fox show for Summerside and other matters were discussed at a well attended meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade last night. Mr. W. E. MacDonald, President, presided.
John E. Campbell, chairman of Marine Committee, stated that the situation regarding shipping facilities at Summerside are almost unbearable. At least four steamers were lost to Summerside this year because of lack of accommodation. We have now two good docks and if we had accommodation, we would have no trouble about boats. It is not necessary to have frost proof sheds, if there were more of the kind that are already on the wharf. At two above zero the potatoes do not freeze and when it is much below zero the harbour is frozen and shipping is stopped. He was glad to see that the Government has voted money to enlarge the docks and make things better generally.
Mr. A. R. Brennan spoke at some length on the cross-Canada Airways.

Fortunately no one was hurt, though both cars were considerably damaged.

Is Acquitted On Charge Of Manslaughter

Harry William Dickie was acquitted in Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday on a charge of manslaughter. The trial arose out of the death of Arthur McQuarrie on July 2.

The case opened before Mr. Justice Arsenault on Tuesday and witnesses were called that day and yesterday. Yesterday the presiding Judge addressed the jury and after deliberation a decision of "not guilty" was reached. The prisoner was discharged from custody.

Addressing the jury the Judge declared he was in favor of school children receiving instructions in highway safety. Education along that line for the coming citizens of Prince Edward Island would greatly reduce the number of highway accidents.

Two appeal cases were heard by the court. Both were appeals from convictions under the Prohibition Act. The appeal of George Kinch was dismissed with costs and in that of Percy (Placidie) Gallant decision was reserved. The court adjourned sine die.
