TO STAND TOGETHER

Orange Free State Supports Transvaal.

TRANSVAAL'S REPLY

Submitted to Wolsely—Gen. White Consulted—Situation Most Critical.

LONDON Sept. 14—(Special)—The Orange Free State may be summoned immediately to a special session.

The Burghers at a meeting decided to stand shoulder to shoulder with the Transvaal.

The Transvaal's reply to Chamberlain's note has been received, but the contents are not made public.

The contents were given to Lord Wolsely, who immediately summoned Gen. Sir George Stewart White, the prospective commander of the forces in Natal. The situation is believed to be most critical.

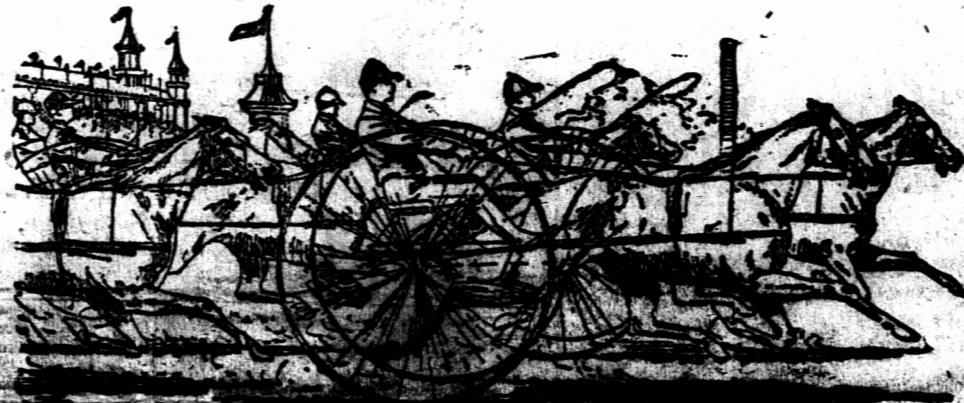

BRILLIANT DAY'S SPORT.

The Directors of the Park Greeted with Beautiful Weather.

A LARGE CROWD IN ATTENDANCE

The 2:25 class to be finished to-day.—An accident on the Track—A Lady Thrown From Her Carriage and Seriously Injured—Two Drivers Fined For Not Complying With The Rules—Some Fast Quarriers Made—A Protest Entered.



A large crowd was in attendance at the races yesterday on the Charlottetown Driving Park. The trains were well filled and the carriages seemed more numerous than on previous occasions.

The rain, which had fallen in the early morning had softened the track in places, but it was nothing to speak of and fast time was made.

The merry-go-round was on the grounds and the familiar air of the colored gentleman who propelled the crank was heard to the uttermost ends of the course.

John Steele, Summerside, distance judge, was in attendance and Galbraith's Band rendered several selections during the afternoon.

The free-for-all was the race of the day and several of the heats were keenly contested.

2.30 CLASS—FIRST HEAT.

This race was first called. Fleetwood, Toney, Loafer and Pandect, jr., were drawn. The remaining starters were Rock Farm Grace, Almont Wilkes, Guy J. and Bessie Rampart, drawing positions in the order named. They got away on the seventh score. Rock Farm Grace had a good lead, which she maintained to the finish, trotting a splendid heat. The other three were for a time well bunched, but Guy J. and Bessie Rampart got second and third places respectively, Almont Wilkes barely saving her distance. Time 2.25½.

2.30 CLASS—SECOND HEAT.

Rock Farm Grace led on the first score, Guy J. a close second. On the first turn the former lost position on a break and Guy J. overtook her. Rock Farm Grace, however, having settled down, gained on her rival and showed greater speed on the last lap. They came down the home stretch, under the lash, like a double team but when about forty yards from the finish Rock Farm Grace again broke and the heat was

Guy J., Rock Farm Grace second; Bessie Rampart, third, and Almont Wilkes fourth. Time 2.28½.

2.30 CLASS—THIRD HEAT.

This heat was sent off on the second score. Rock Farm Grace and Guy J. were even to the quarter, when the former took the lead, holding it until coming into the half, when a break gave Guy the lead. Guy trotted well, holding first place till coming down the stretch. Gracie was then coming like the wind, rapidly gaining on Guy, and when within fifty yards of the wire she forged ahead and won the heat. Bessie Rampart was third and Almont Wilkes distanced. Time 2.26½.

2.30 CLASS—FOURTH HEAT.

Never headed was Rock Farm Grace's record in this heat. She led from the start, trotted like clockwork throughout, and winning by several lengths, while Guy J. and Bessie Rampart each broke twice. Rock Farm Grace thus wins the race. Time, 2.30.

FREE FOR ALL—FIRST HEAT.

The eager crowd had anticipated something unusual when the free-for-all race was called. Minnie and Beau Prince were drawn leaving Belmont, Minnie, Montrose, Warren Guy, and Provider, who started in the order named. The scoring record of the Charlottetown track at least was broken and veteran horsemen were compelled to resort to adjectives, after having seen the horses scoring for the twelfth and thirteenth times. After the eighteenth score the judge called the drivers up to the stand and gave them some sound advice, informing them that if they did not score with the poll horse they would be fined \$5. On the nineteenth score the order of things was about as before, and the drivers of Minnie and Montrose were obliged to pay the fine before starting again. On the twentieth score a start was

made to the great delight of the spectators on the grand stand who had almost exhausted their patience with the jockeying of some of the drivers. Minota got a good lead which she kept to the finish; Provider coming down the home stretch neck and neck with Warren Guy, the latter horse overtook Provider but failed to secure second place because of break. Time 2:22½.

FREE FOR ALL—SECOND HEAT.

Minota led, but was passed by Provider, and on the back stretch Warren Guy passed both. At the half there was not a length between Provider, Warren Guy and Minota. It was then that Provider broke and fell back to third position. Warren Guy and Minota struggled gallantly for first place, the former winning by a length; Minota second, Provider third, Belmont fourth and Almont Wilkes fifth. Time 2.22½.

FREE-FOR-ALL—THIRD HEAT.

In this heat a start was effected on the seventh score. Warren Guy took the lead from the commencement to the finish defeating Minota by a length, Minota pressing Warren Guy hard for first place. Provider third, Belmont fourth, Montrose distanced. Time, 2.20, being the fastest heat of the day. Two last quarters were made in 35 seconds.

FREE-FOR-ALL—FOURTH HEAT.

In the fourth heat Warren Guy again took the lead with Minota a close second, the former winning the heat and race. Belmont, by an extra burst of speed passed Provider on the home stretch securing third place. Time, 2.21½.

2.25—FIRST HEAT.

The starters in the heat were Tansy, Romp L., Minnie and Bijou. Beau Prince and Joe Youngheart were drawn. Before the race began considerable discussion took place with reference to Minnie having on hoppers. Mr. Leaman filed a protest with the judges. The driver decided to remove them before decision of the judge was rendered. The horses got away on the 6th score. Minnie took lead from Romp after passing the quarter. Bijou came up well and finished second. During the heat a collision occurred on the back stretch between Romp L. and Tansy, the latter's sulky being badly broken which prevented Tansy from finishing. The judges allowed him to start in the next heat, giving him fourth place in the heat. Time 2.27½.

2-25—2ND HEAT.

It was 6:30 when the second heat was called; the grand stand was fast becoming empty; the trains were leaving the city and the shades of evening were falling. After scoring nearly a dozen times the word "go" was given to the satisfaction of the remaining spectators. The start was a poor one. At the quarter Romp L. led with Minnie at his wheel and following in a bunch were Tansy and Bijou. During the last quarter Minnie overhauled and passed Romp L. and both came down the home stretch at a tremendous gait, Minnie winning by half a length. Bijou third and Tansy fourth. Time 2.25½.

At the conclusion the Judges announced that the rules would not allow them to call the next heat and it was decided to have the remaining heat trotted this afternoon at 2 o'clock sharp, when the entrance fee to the grounds will be 25cts. The Grand Stand will be free.
