U. S. attitude to Azores, Cape Verdels.

WASHINGTON, July 14—(AP)—Sumner Welles, acting Secretary of State, said today the United States is anxious that Portugal retain sovereignty over the Azores and Cape Verde Islands.

He called attention at a press conference, however, to a statement in President Roosevelt's message to Congress on the occupation of Iceland that was vital to American security that strategic Atlantic outposts "remain in friendly hands."

He recalled the President's assertion that the United States could not permit their occupation by Germany to be used "as air or naval bases for eventual attack against the western hemisphere."

Welles made his comment in connection with a statement by the Portuguese Minister, Joao Dibiachi, in New York Saturday, that Portugal had received assurance from the United States would not move into the Azores or Cape Verde Islands.

TODAY'S WAR MAP

The battle in Russia, which Hitler and most of the world's military critics thought would yield a decisive German victory in from one to three weeks, has developed a lull because the Russians fought the Germans to a standstill in front of the Stalin fortified line. The first stage of the battle, lasting nearly three weeks, has come to an end. Its result might be called a tactical victory for the Germans and a strategic victory for the Russians. On the map the numbers signify (1) Little change on the Finnish front. (2) Germans may no headway in the Baltic sector, where Revel possibly remain in Russian hands. (3) Russians halt Germans in vital Minsk and Brest-Litovsk sector. (4) German forces held at this point where they had been dangerous. (5) Nothing important under way on the Bessarabian front.
