Local Horsemen Prepare For Big Winter Season

Victoria Park Speedway Will Be Scene Of Greatest Racing In Years—Prize Ribbons For Winning Horses Mooted.

It looks as though there is going to be a lively time on the Speedway this winter. Charlottetown horse race enthusiasts are making active preparations for the biggest program of matinee racing that has ever taken place during any season. The Victoria Driving Club, which has taken over the sponsorship of winter racing in this city, is going to make an active campaign for membership and will invite many out-of-town horsemen to join them. It is their purpose to stage bi-weekly events with classes for the fastest trotters and pacers and also intermediate classes that will bring in less speedy animals. One of the most active members of the club believes that interest can be greatly strengthened by the presentation to each winner of a ribbon similar to those given at the Silver Fox exhibition, but with a horse's head in the enamelled brooch instead of a fox. These could be stamped with the club's name and the year date. No doubt this would prove a big incentive as these ribbons are attractive and would grace a den or room of any kind. Speaking of the available material for racing, some time ago a member deplored the fact that there was not enough horses, but even that is now being remedied as a few days ago Mr. Willard Kelly of Southport, who is a keen judge of speed and an expert reinsman, arrived home with twenty head of record and non-record trotters and pacers selected from some of the best campaigning and matinee racing stables in New England. Visit Of United Church Moderator To The Island

"I have come from the west," said Dr. Oliver, "which I love with all my heart and all my mind, and all my strength. Before coming to the island he had lived and labored in the west. The spoken at a number of centres in west is built on the east, from which Nova Scotia. This morning he left as a large part of the population for Sackville, Moncton, and other points in New Brunswick, progress and religious leadership."

In the course of his address, Dr. He had been 21 years in Saskatchewan. Oliver, who is an exceptionally able man. Not long ago it was a mission station receiving support from other churches. Today there are ten United Churches in Saskatchewan.

"The west is dynamic and progressive, and the west is grateful. We want the east to understand the west a little better," said Dr. Oliver. "The United Church without Canada would be impoverished; and Canada without the United Church would be spiritually impoverished."

The Dr. then proceeded to take as his theme the dream of St. Paul at Ephesus. The words of the Apostle occur in Revelations, "His servants shall serve him; they shall reign forever and ever." Paul had the conviction that there is work for the Christian Church to do. It is not the clamorous corporation nor the noisy organization that do the abiding work but it is the Christian Church. Empires may disappear but not the Church, its work remains. The Church alone can lift a man to the Father. Another conviction of St. Paul was that God is in the heavens. God does not forget, said the speaker.

He then told of conditions in the dry areas in Saskatchewan, where the crops had been ruined by the drought and where the people had nothing much left except courage. The excess of "beautiful sunshine" had turned what should have been a garden into a desert. He told of a farmer selling a load of barley which netted him only fifty cents after he had paid for the threshing. Another farmer after selling a load of what was \$250 in dollars after expenses were paid. Nevertheless, in other parts of the world millions are starving for lack of bread. Something has evidently gone wrong with the economic organization, said Dr. Oliver, but God has not forgotten. It is not God's job to make wealthy farmers in Saskatchewan or rich people in Prince Edward Island. His work is to make us Christian.

The Moderator said he had visited Sackville where Paul had preached 1900 years ago. Today it is simply a mass of ruins.
