Commencing August 1st, 1908, we have, after due deliberation decided that it will be compulsory to retire from strictly cash basis. For the last ten years our books have been filled up with small and large amounts, and making rough estimation twenty-five per cent of which we have been unable to collect. The time lost in keeping a set of books, itemizing small amounts, is in itself no small task, for instance, a sale to be made requires an entry in the order book, then transferred to the ledger. The bill is then made out, placed in an envelope, a two-cent stamp is required to insure its delivery through the post office. Months roll around. A duplicate bill is necessarily sent, two cent stamped envelope. No attention is paid to this and a collector is sent out. He returns with the report could not catch like results.
