

EVIDENCE GIVEN AT THE BRITISH TITANIC INQUIRY

Four Bulkheads Closed From the Bridge—Ismay's Conduct

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 9—Evidence that the doors of four watertight bulkheads had been opened after having been closed from the bridge was introduced today at the British Wreck Commission inquiry into the loss of the White Star steamer Titanic.

This was done, according to Thomas Dillon of the Engineers staff, in order that the engineer and crew might reach the pumps and the order came from the Chief Engineer. Through the attorney of the White Star people he told the court that these doors, having been once shut, could not again be opened except by being released from the bridge.

DESTRUCTION OF EVIDENCE BY THE TRUST

NEW YORK, May 8—The destruction of the evidence used before the grand jury in the famous Jackson wire pool cases by officials of the American Steel and Wire company, just one of the big subsidiaries of the United States Steel corporation, was the principal subject of the testimony today in hearings of the government's dissolution suit against the corporation before Commissioner Henry P. Brown. It is the government's purpose, according to Judge Dickinson, special counsel in the case, to determine whether the papers were destroyed before or after the filing of the pending suit on October 26th last.

SAYS RICHESON IS A MORMON ELDER

(Canadian Press.) BOSTON, May 8—The author of the affidavit charging C. V. T. Richeson with being a Mormon Elder, Mrs. Lucie E. Britain, claims to have been formerly connected with the Mormon Church and to have been a celestial wife of a New York man, who is at the head of the Mormon organization in the east. In the statement Mrs. Britain asserts that she has known Richeson for several years past, first meeting him three years ago at a Mormon conference held on Staten Island, where she says the Baptist clergyman was recognized as one of the Mormon elders, and was particularly active in the affairs of the conference. She has since met him many times in and about Boston, and has given him the Mormon signs, which were always answered, she claims.

She says she attended a Mormon conference at Providence, R. I., a little over a year ago, at which Richeson was present, and that she received commands from him as a Mormon elder at a Boston gathering of the leaders of the church. "While it is not common, it is not unusual to find the more educated of the Mormon elders preaching in the pulpits of evangelical churches which baptize by immersion," said Mrs. Britain last night in an interview. She said that night in an interview, Mrs. Richeson was converted to Mormonism while still a student at William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo., from which he was expelled in 1889. At that time Richeson became attached to a young woman who now makes her home in Salt Lake City. To this young woman is due Richeson's trend toward Mormonism, Mrs. Britain believes.

JOY RIDE OF THE MAYORS ENDS IN POLICE COURT

(Canadian Press.) TRURO, May 8—What is described by the chairman of the police as a joy ride Thursday night last, had its sequel today in the police court when C. B. McMullin, Arthur Stearns and Alonzo McCallum were before Stipendiary Magistrate Grove. On the evening in question the mayor of Moncton and several eldersmen visited Truro, and at the instance of Mayor Stuart, were treated to a ride in automobiles around town and surrounding country. It is alleged the speed thru town was excessive, and Councillor Dunbar, chairman of the police, caused papers to be served on the drivers of the autos. The case is attracting wide attention and the court room was crowded all day, the presence of some of the town officials in the motor cars, lending grace to the occurrence hitherto lacking in cases of this kind. The case against Stevens was the only one finished today. Prominent counsel is engaged by both sides, S. D. McLellan, K. C., defending and W. M. Ferguson, for the prosecution. Judgment on the other cases go to trial tomorrow on the Stevens case reserved.
