Has 190 Bodies of Titanic Victims—116 Buried At Sea—Scenes at the Docking of the Mackay-Bennett—the Investigation.

(Special to The Guardian.) HALIFAX, April 30—While the city church bells tolled and British flags fluttered down to half mast, the cable ship Mackay-Bennett steamed slowly into Halifax this morning bearing the dead picked up at the place where the White Star Liner Titanic sank.
