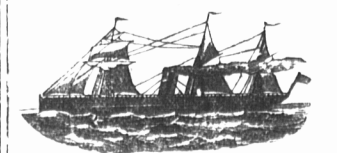

## THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Wharf and Station Nuisance Dealt with by Council

Half Holiday for July 22—Committee to go Ahead with Welcome Day in Old Home Week.

An adjourned meeting of the Town Council was held last night. On the request of S. H. Jones a new sidewalk was ordered to be built from the Driving Park to Parkside Farm.

The matter of crowds gathering at Railway Wharf and Railway Station was discussed at some length and the following resolution passed:

Resolved, that the Town Council offer to furnish a policeman to assist the railway authorities under the direction of the station agent in preventing the obstruction caused by persons crowding the trains and wharf on arrival of steamer, if the railway pays the expense attached thereto.

A motion was passed that the Mayor and Council request citizens to suspend business and observe the afternoon of Friday, July 22, as a half holiday in consideration of its being P. E. Islanders' Home Day and the last day in the program of the Islanders' Reunion celebration.

A committee consisting of Councillors Morris, Clark, and Morrison was appointed to carry out arrangements in connection with the opening welcome in the Old Home week, program at an expense not to exceed \$100.

A E Baker's yacht, Juanita, changed hands yesterday. H T Holman is the lucky owner.

An important meeting of the Tourist Association will be held in the Council Chamber at 8 o'clock this evening.

The barkentine Ramona, Capt. Olsen sailed yesterday afternoon for Bristol Channel with a cargo of 4000 bus. oats loaded by the owners Messrs Richards.

The steamer Restigouche arrived here Sunday afternoon with a large freight of general merchandise from Montreal and left at 11 a m yesterday with 450 bags oats from this port for St. John's, Nfld.

In connection with the Islanders' Reunion rates at one first class single fare has been granted at all stations on the P. E. I. Railway to Summerside on July 11, 14, 18 and 21, good for return up to and including July 25.

The gasoline engine and pump ordered by the Town Council was taken delivery of yesterday having been brought by the Steamer Restigouche on Sunday. Perhaps there will now be plenty of water forthcoming to keep the dust down.

The Dominion Day races at Summerside Driving Park, Free for all, purse \$150; 2:27 class mixed, \$100; 2:45 class mixed, \$100. Five per cent to enter and five per cent additional from winners. Entries close June 16—G. M. Reid 44 101.

In the Supreme Court yesterday evening the case of Alexander McKay vs Angus McKinnon was concluded and a verdict given for plaintiff for \$300 damages. On the request of Mr. Stewart K. C. the time for moving for a new trial was extended until the Trinity Term. Neil McQuarrie, K. C. on plaintiff, W. S. Stewart, K. C. and A. C. Saunders for defendant. This ended the session of the Supreme Court here.

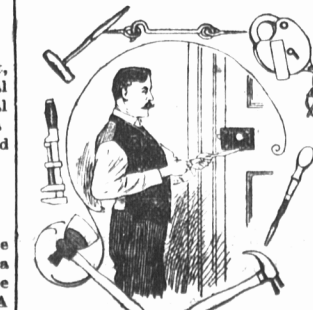
