BURNED TO DEATH NEAR MT. STEWART

Alone In House When Fire Broke Out - Was Burned To Death.

The particulars of one of the saddest stories that this paper has had to record for some time were learned by The Guardian by telephone from a correspondent in Mount Stewart last evening.

Many readers will remember that in connection with the recent stranding of the Plant Line steamer while on her way from Boston to this port, there were two little passengers, three and four years old respectively, the youngest a girl, who had been sent by their father, in care of the ship's officers to Charlottetown.

The little ones passed safely through the accident to the Perry, and were met by relatives on their arrival by the str. Northumberland in Charlottetown.

FATAL ACCIDENT TO EUGENE MCAULIFFE

Son of Jere McAuliffe the Well-Known Actor, Crushed Beneath Cars in Saint John Station Last Night - Trying to Save His Dog He Fell.

ST. JOHN, June 22-(Special)-Eugene McAuliffe, the fourteen year old son of Jere McAuliffe, actor, was crushed under the train just as he reached the Union Depot here late this evening and will die.

The McAuliffe company closed their engagement in Chatham last Friday and since then Mr. and Mrs. McAuliffe and son have been visiting P. E. Island.

When the train had only about forty feet to go at the depot the boy's dog jumped from the train and the boy jumped after it and slipped and fell under the moving car.

ONLY COPY OF CHRIST PORTRAIT

The Original is at Genoa Where it Was Taken in 14th Century.

Here is the sequel: Maurice Lyons, the well-known collector, whose famous "Imperial opal" was shown to the colonial premiers when they were here in 1902, has in his possession what he believes is the only copy of the portrait of Christ referred to, which Thaddeus took to King Agbar.

About forty years ago, however, Thomas Heaphy, an artist, who devoted many years to investigating the origins of the traditional likeness of Christ, managed, after a great deal of trouble, to see the portrait in St. Bartholomew's Church.

Mr. Lyons had an opportunity of comparing his portrait with Heaphy's sketch, and he does not doubt that they deal with the same sub-set. As apart from Heaphy's sketch, there is understood to be only one copy of the original in existence, Mr. Lyons, if that is so, must possess that copy.

ROUSE'S POINT, N. Y., June 20-A desire to see the circus which came to town yesterday cost Fred Sanschougan his life. He started out early in the morning intending to see the parade and afterwards to see the show, but his plans were disarranged by a policeman who arrested him, during the afternoon on a charge of intoxication and placed him in the town lockup, a small frame building.

Sanschougan made several vain attempts to bring about his release in time to see the circus and as a last resort set fire to the door of the prison, apparently believing it would be liberated as soon as the flames were seen. The fire spread so quickly, however, that the whole building was enveloped before assistance came, and it was too late to rescue the prisoner and he was burned to death.

TWO CATTLEMEN OF BIG WEALTH

Fight Duel With Guns Both Being Killed At First Shot Result Of Quarrel Over Trade And Old Feud.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. June 22-(Special)-A. M. Sailer and Edward Jones, wealthy cattlemen were killed in a duel last night near St. Vrail, New Mexico, 200 miles east of here.

The men were neighbors and quarreled over a cattle trade. Guns were drawn and fired simultaneously, both men being instantly killed. The trouble is said to have been the outgrowth of an old feud.

CONTRADICTS DR. PRINGLE

Rev. J. Seymour Says Dance Halls In Dawson Are Wiped Out.

VICTORIA, B.C., June 20-Rev. J. R. Seymour, for two years pastor of the Methodist church at Dawson and for many years a worker in the various mining camps in British Columbia gave an interview today in which he left the impression that the stories of immorality were wholly for political ends.

The opinion, he said, was prevalent in Yukon that Dr. Pringle considered himself ill-used by the Liberal party, and would take the stump against it. He considered that the moral standard in Dawson was quite as high as in any place in British Columbia of the same size.
