SUGGESTION TO GARDENERS-Owing to the lateness of the season and the consequent delay in the maturing of the onion crop in Upper Provinces it has been difficult to secure sufficient onions for pickling and chow-chow making purposes. Under these circumstances it would be advisable for all tomato growers to leave their tomatoes on the vines for a few days yet or until the onions, which have been ordered and are expected in about a week reach here. Every facility is being put into operation to hasten the arrival of the onions but in the meantime tomato growers will be wise to govern themselves accordingly.
