HANGED HIMSELF TO A RAFTER.

A Bright Young Man Sacrificed.

Mother Discovered Body Hanging in the Woodshed when Going for Kindling to Start the Morning fire

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 25.—(Special)—A popular and influential young Polish gentleman whose home is at No. 217 Rother avenue, this city, has taken his own life.

His mother in going to the woodshed in the morning for the kindling to start the fire discovered his body hanging from a rafter by a clothes-line.

He was 23 years old; his parents were well to do; he had a good education and splendid prospects in life. He was employed by the Prudential Insurance Co. and was very successful as a business man. So energetically and faithful did he perform his duties that during the last year he has several times had his salary increased.

AT THE QUEEN'S FUNERAL

A German Squadron And Many Foreign War-Ships Will Take Part.

REMAINS REMOVED TO MORTUARY CHAPEL

There Will Be No Public Lying in State and Few Will See the Dead Queen—Fuss About President McKinley's Half-Masting His Flag—Governor of N. B. and His Ministers Take The Oath Of Allegiance.

REMOVED TO MORTUARY CHAPEL.

COWES, Jan. 25.—(Special)—The Queen's body was to-day removed to the Mortuary Chapel in the dining room by the Blue Jackets from the Royal Yacht.

NO PUBLIC LYING IN STATE.

Only a few persons will be admitted to view the remains.

There will be no public lying in state.

BRINGING HOME THE DEAD QUEEN.

The remains will be taken to Portsmouth on the Royal Yacht Alberta, and will remain on board over Friday night.

THE PRESIDENT CRITICISED.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(Special)—The President's order placing the White House flag at half mast is causing considerable talk among the Diplomats, who contrast the action with that on the death of Sovereigns of other nations, and the Diplomatic Corps members say that failure to pay a similar mark of respect in future will be a significant breach of etiquette for which offence can justly be taken.

HONORING VICTORIAN'S WOMANHOOD.

to fly at half mast was not to Victoria as Queen, but because of her greatness as a woman and the many friendships shown by her to the United States.

THE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE IN N. B.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 25.—(Special)—Governor McLellan and his Council to-day took the oath of allegiance to King Edward VII.

The ceremony was a very imposing one. MANY FOREIGN NOTABLES COMING.

So many representatives of foreign Courts are coming that all the Royal Palaces will be filled and some hotels and residences have been secured.

KING'S MESSAGE TO PARLIAMENT.

In both Houses of Parliament to-day identical messages from the King were read and resolutions of condolence voted on his bereavement and congratulations on his accession.

THE memorial window of Messrs. Sentner, McLeod & Co's store attracted a great deal of attention yesterday afternoon. In the centre of the northern window beautifully draped in the deepest mourning, stands a large arch similarly draped. Beneath the arch, and resting on a mourning shrouded easel, is a large photo of Queen Victoria, flanked by the Union Jack dipped. Overhead is a stary crown, emblematic of the crown immortal. In front of the photo is a large white tablet with the simple inscription, "At Rest" and supporting a crown and sceptre. A white lily in full bloom completes one of the most appropriate and tastefully arranged windows we have yet seen. The southern window, although somewhat similarly designed, leaves a very different impression on the mind of the beholder. Instead of the emblems of woe, are displayed the royal purple and gold indicative of kingly power. In the centre is an excellent likeness of the new Sovereign. Beneath it is shown a good representation of the King's sceptre, or the so-called St. Edward's staff of gold, surmounted with a cross and orb. This sceptre is borne in front of the sovereign during the processional part of the ceremony of coronation, and has been in use since the time of Charles II. This also is a copy of a much older one, which was said to contain in the orb a fragment of the true Cross. A purple tablet bearing the words, "Long Live the King," completes a most interesting picture.
