FIRE DESTROYS 75,000 BUSHELS WHEAT AND FLAX

WEYBURN, Sask., March 20—Fire which broke out at three o'clock yesterday morning in the western elevator here, completely gutted that building and only the effective work of the high pressure plant prevented the destruction of the Canadian Pacific depot, the Massey-Harris warehouse and other elevators. A stiff wind was blowing from the north and it was a cough and go. Seventy thousand bushels of wheat and ax are a total loss.

TO AMEND THE DRY DOCK ACT

OTTAWA, March 19—The Hon. F. D. Monk has given notice of the following resolution upon which will be based a bill amending the Dry Dock Subsidies Act: "That it is expedient to amend the Dry Dock Subsidies Act, 1911, and to provide, (a) for the construction of dry docks for naval and general purposes, costing for the purposes of subsidy calculations not more than \$5,500,000, being dry docks other than floating dry docks, of dimensions to be prescribed in a bill to be based upon this resolution; and (b) that the subsidy payable in respect of such dry docks shall be a sum not exceeding three and one-half per cent, of the cost of the work, as fixed and determined under the provisions of the Dry Dock Subsidies Act, 1911."

(Continued from page 1.) of St. Peter's and St. Paul's Auxiliaries. Speeches were made by Rev. C. Dew, White, Summerside; A. B. Warburton; Rev. A. W. Watson, Kensington; Rev. R. M. Fenton and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. A hearty vote of thanks was rendered Mrs. (Canon) Simpson, the President of the W. A. for continuous and faithful service to that Society. This was responded to by Canon Simpson. The delegates then parted taking the trains outward in the afternoon for their homes. The new officers of the W. At the annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society held in St. Paul's Church, School Room, last evening, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald presided. Canon Simpson delivered a thoughtful address on "Church Finances." He declared that the principle of Church giving was entirely wrong and made an appeal on behalf of the system, whereby one should lay aside a certain proportion of his income as a gift to the Church. This principle, he believed would settle the present financial difficulties in connection with Church work. He said systematic giving should be considered an act of worship, just as prayer is. Every child should be brought up to give. He advocated the envelope system as being the proper one. He said that the parent should enter his child upon the giving list so that when he should grow up to years of understanding, he should have acquired giving as a matter of habit. Canon Simpson also discussed the propriety of erecting magnificent churches and neglecting missions. He said that experience shows that although more money has been spent in Churches to the glory of God, that such Churches have also given increased amounts to missions. He cited the case of Halifax where the amount for missions had been increased by one third, even after \$250,000 had been spent for a Cathedral. In St. Paul's congregation in Charlottetown, \$300 was spent twenty years ago for missions. Since then \$50,000 worth of property has been built and the amount for missions has been trebled. Rev. Dew, White of Summerside read a carefully prepared paper on the "Attitude of the Anglican Church towards Church Unity." He referred to the recent movement to bring about union between the Presbyterians, Methodists, and Congregationalists and what that union implied. He declared that the Church of England had always stood for unity and gave illustrations from history to show where it had unified the nation. He referred to the basis of union as set forth in the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral. In this basis the Nicene creed was one of the features. He declared that the Church of England is comprehensive enough to take in every type of religious thought in the world today. Their attitude towards union should not be one of idleness but they should take a keen and active interest in what is going on around it. A short discussion followed in which Mr. Justice Hazard, Rev. Messrs. Trivett and Harper took part. On motion of R. L. Cotton, seconded by Crisp Moore, a committee consisting of Rev. Messrs. Simpson, T. W. Murphy, R. M. Fenton, was appointed to deal with the question of Church extension and report at the meeting to be held at Alberton.

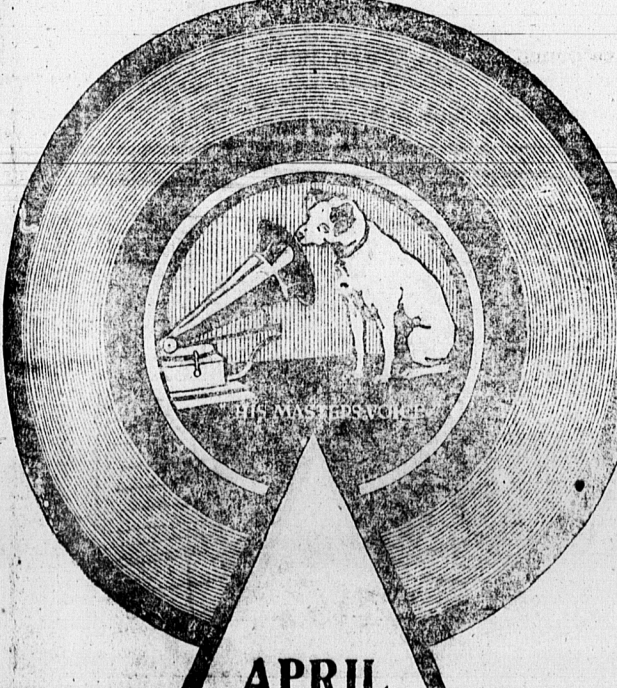
