An illustration of how the break in the navigation affects business is shown by the experiences of persons sending live stock to the Amherst Winter Fair. Mr. Calbeck of Augustine Cove shipped 15 hogs and a number of poultry on Friday last at Cape Traverse. They reached Charlottetown at noon on Saturday and cannot go forward till today's trip of the Minto, being four days on the road.

Friday evening James E. McDonald M. L. A. of Cardigan received a telegram saying that his schooner Carmena is a total wreck at Ladhaine Newfoundland. The Carmena sailed from Cardigan Wednesday Nov. 19th for St. Pierre with a general cargo of produce and cattle, and arrived there Nov. 23rd. She is supposed to have left St. Pierre on return about Wednesday Dec. 3rd, two days before the big storm. The Carmena was 18 years old, 93 tons registered. A short time ago she underwent a considerable amount of repair and was refitted with new sails. She was insured to the amount of \$1,000 only.

One of the most artistic windows of the season is shown at the Apothecaries Hall. The work was done by Hammond Bethune the popular druggist and reflects much credit upon him. A Indian hut made of tobacco leaf is shown in one corner and in the other an old fashioned pot boils. The whole is most realistic and the effect is added to for advertising purposes by the large display of cigarettes, cigars, pipes, tobacco, etc. which is scattered around.

The schooner Swift Current coal laden for C. Lyons & Co. of this city, which left Hawkebury Thursday in company with schooner Vivian has not yet been reported. She was last seen by the crew of the Vivian astern of that vessel while they were off Souris Friday morning. The Vivian arrived here Sunday week. The Swift Current was a vessel of about 65 tons and was owned by Beck Bros. Murray Harbor, two of whom are aboard schooner. It is possible she may have sought shelter in the vicinity of Picton Island and may yet be detained there.

CONSIDERABLE indignation is expressed in marine circles during the past few days at the action of the Coban towards the schooner Evolution, Captain Boudrot, now ashore on the southwest bar of Governor's Island. The story of the Captain as told the Guardian is as follows: On Wednesday forenoon his schooner was towed outside the blockhouse by Bat's tug. All was clear water at the time with no sign of ice in sight. When the vessel was near the bell buoy however light drift ice and lolly encircled her, the wind died down and the Evolution was left helpless in six fathoms of water. When the Coban came along shortly after, the Evolution hung out signals of distress, blew a powerful horn and took every means of attracting her attention but still no notice was taken and no effort made to take the schooner in tow, notwithstanding that she was helpless, and the water was sufficiently deep for the Coban to lie along side. Soon after the wind rose to a gale and the ice carried the Evolution ashore where she is at present. The action of the steamer is very strongly commented on by all who have heard the circumstances, and it is understood that the matter will be reported to Lloyd's by their Agent here.

ARRANGEMENTS had been made with the Steam Navigation Company for the transportation of all persons attending the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst at one dollar for the return trip across the Straits. As the Navigation Company's boats had stopped running, Vice President Calbeck, on Saturday wired to President Elderkin at Amherst to have like arrangements made with the Government boats. Mr. Elderkin replied that he had wired the Department at Ottawa, and if instructions did not arrive in time, those going to the Fair would purchase regular tickets and take receipts for the money paid with a view to having the surplus refunded.

At a surprise party which invaded the Methodist Parsonage Winsloe South, on the evening of the 24th, inst., and which consisted of about fifty near neighbours and friends, the subject of address and a purse of money were presented on behalf of the Winsloe Congregation by Miss May Rodd to Miss Constance Parkins, organist of the work as organist which she had done for over two years.
