PRESIDENT WILSON'S MESSAGE TO CONGRESS

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WHY SO MUCH GOLD IS COMING TO CANADA

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—The explanation here of the recent apparently heavy import of gold from New York is simple. Shipments of grain and elsewhere abroad have been unprecedentedly large on account of the exceptionally large wheat crop in the west and its early maturity and the favorable weather since have enabled the grain to be taken out in much larger amounts than ever before.

CHURCHILL IS AGAIN IN LIME LIGHT

LONDON, December 23.—Winston Spencer Churchill, whose aeroplane ascends as a passenger have been numerous, now possesses the distinction of being the first cabinet minister in the world to act as an air pilot. During the greater part of a flight of an hour's duration at East Church on Saturday, he personally took control of the machine. On Saturday morning Mr. Churchill had some final lessons to complete his experience, and after lunch, donning his leather jacket and airman's cap, he took his seat in a dual control biplane with Captain William Lushington. When the machine reached the height of 500 feet, Mr. Churchill took over the control, the wind blowing steadily but strongly, and the biplane took nearly an hour to cover ten miles which separated the East Church flying ground from the Isle of Grain.

A LONE BANDIT HELD UP EXPRESS TRAIN

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 2.—Horace E. Montague, travelling passenger agent for the Southern Pacific Railway, was shot and killed by a bandit last night in a Pullman car of the west-bound Southern express a few miles out of Los Angeles. Boarding the train at Pomona, the bandit went through the rear Pullman, compelling the passengers to hand over their money and jewelry. As Montague stepped into the aisle of the car the highwayman grabbed him by the overcoat lapel and said: "Throw up your hands."

FIRST LORD DID SPLENDIDLY

The First Lord remained at the control nearly three-quarters of an hour, flying to and fro, and accomplishing a distance of from thirty-five to forty miles. Then Captain Lushington took charge again and brought the machine to earth. Eye witnesses of the flight said that the First Lord did splendidly. The machine was kept at a splendid angle and throughout he was very cool indeed. Earlier in the day the First Lord went on two separate flights as a passenger and also inspected all the machines at the Royal Aero Club flying grounds at East Church. Mr. Churchill has now made fourteen aerial voyages, eleven of them in aeroplanes.

RUSSIAN MINISTER TO SWEDEN RECALLED

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 3.—The Russian Minister to Sweden, Savinsky, yesterday presented his letters of recall to the King. M. Savinsky is said to be compromised by an espionage affair, in which several Swedish subjects are also involved. He has been mentioned frequently in connection with the impending divorce between Prince William of Sweden and the Princess, who was the Grand Duchess Marie Pavlovna, daughter of the Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovich of Russia.
