Dempsey May Fight Luis Firpo Again

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, hurried through Chicago to day on his way to New York for the West to look after a proposition for another Dempsey-Firpo match to be staged in England or the Argentine. Kearns said he had received a tentative offer from a syndicate for such a match but was uncertain as to the exact proposition until he reached New York. Dempsey, he said, probably will come east next month. He said he was considering a proposition for the theatrical and exhibition tour of the champion in this country and also one for an European engagement and did not know which would be accepted.

He added that he did not think the champion will fight again before late next spring or in the summer.

Clean Brand of Hockey

At the postponed annual meeting of the National Hockey League which is to be held in Ottawa on December 1, certain proposals are to be submitted by the Ottawa Hockey Association looking to the elimination of practices which have seriously marred this fine winter game in recent seasons and have disgusted the lovers of clean sport. It should scarcely be necessary to state that the public who follow professional hockey, and support it, want to see the game decently played; they have no love for deliberate rowdiness and not the smallest admiration for players who indulge in it. Such players are, fortunately in the minority, but that is reason enough why they should not be permitted to bring the game into disrepute; if they cannot or will not play the game as it should be played, they should be put out of it and kept out. The proposals of the Ottawa Association will, if adopted, clothe the president of the N. H. L. with practically unlimited authority in dealing with offending players. The details are for the League representatives to determine, but the principle is one of no difference of opinion nor should there be any hesitation in adopting and enforcing whatever drastic remedies are considered necessary. That existing penalties are not sufficiently severe is proven in the frequency and flagrancy of the examples of bad sportsmanship which lovers of good hockey have had no reason to deplore. Hockey can be made a clean game just as professional baseball—the most highly organized and commercialized of all sports has been

Every Seat Sold For Olympic Meet

PARIS, Nov. 27.—The French Olympic Games Committee already has hung up the "standing room only" sign at the Colombes stadium, although the official opening of the 1924 Olympic Games is still seven months away.

The stadium provides accommodation for 70,000 spectators. There will be 20,000 reserved seats divided evenly among the two covered stands on each side of the track, known as "Official," and the "Marathon" stands. The remaining fifty thousand persons will be accommodated with standing room at both ends of the bowl and at the turns.

The British and the United States Olympic committees have requested five thousand seats for spectators from these countries, while Sweden and Italy have each requested 1500 seats. The remaining 7,000 seats have virtually all been reserved by the small nations leaving hardly any for the French committee to dispose of to French sport lovers.

BOSTON, Nov. 27.—Young Stribling, schoolboy light heavyweight of Macon, Ga., was awarded the decision over Joe Egan, of Dorchester, after a dull 10-round bout here tonight. Stribling weighed 166 pounds and his opponent 163.

The Georgia schoolboy was cheered by a section of the audience, and there were frequent references to his battle with Mike McTigue at Columbus, Ga., and to the Ku Klux Klan.

Egan was on the defensive throughout, and the only attack displayed by Stribling was a club-like right to the head.

Daring Jumper Injured in Fall

TORONTO, Nov. 27.—Miss Dorothy Wood, the Calgary equestrienne, who has been electrifying crowds at the Coliseum here in a spectacular stunt of jumping her horse over seven-passenger touring cars, met with an accident when her mount caught its hind feet in the automobile and toppled over with its young rider under it. Miss Wood received injuries to her head, but after the girl pluckily remounted her horse and cleared the jump.

Sinking British Towns Gradually

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, November 23.—A Royal Commission has been appointed to deal with the question of land subsidence in England.

The mining of coal and salt has now become so extensive that every day little bits of this country are disappearing. Every year in Great Britain a square mile of soil, a foot in thickness, is removed at a great depth in the earth. In a cold mine the working pass ways are propped up with great quantities of timber, but as the soil is dissolved out water and pumped to the surface, it is impossible to support the ground above the dissolving bed of rock salt.

This results in those miniature aquifers which have given towns in the Cheshire area their nightmarish appearance. Houses lean against each other; the floors and walls bulge; the doors and windows assume astonishing shapes.

Some buildings have disappeared altogether. Lanes, 80, 90 and 100 feet deep, have appeared where once there was solid earth, and even these have been known suddenly to empty themselves through a crack in the earth, into some underground cavern that was once a mass of rock salt.

In some districts the mining of coal has had no less serious results, and the commissions will take evidence of this matter also during the past few weeks they have been considerable landslides in Durham and South Wales. In the latter district, indeed, whole mountains are moving, as they split and slide owing to mining operations.

Only the fact that some of the old workings have rapidly filled with water has prevented the extension of damage, which has yet become formidable enough to endanger the safety of canals and railways.

At a town in Staffordshire a whole street drowned five feet in a week, so that houses became unsafe and fell to pieces. It is difficult to see how such subsidences can be stopped, without considerably restricting two important national industries, which, together, give us such important products as coal, salt, chlorine, carbonate of soda, and bleaching powder.
