FREDERICTON, Sept. 20.—Peter Faren 2:07, the St. John free-for-all pacer, is the first arrival for the Fredericton Park Association's fall races opening here next Tuesday.

The Peter the Great, pacer and the big trotter, Forefeather 2:16 1/2, both owned by D. O'Keefe, of St. John, were shipped from St. Stephen yesterday to Fredericton to rest up in preparation for the meeting here next week. The St. John horses have been taken from the Acker Stable, and it is believed both will be fit to repeat their performances of last July over the Fredericton track. On July 27th Peter Faren set the Fredericton track 2:08 1/2.

During the week both standard and yellow sugar dropped \$1.00 per hundred weight here, making present prices \$21.00 to \$21.15 for standard, and \$20.60 to \$20.65 for yellow.

"All the necessary arrangements were efficiently carried out by Mr. W. Daniel and the remains have been sent to his home in Prince Edward Island, accompanied by Mr. Henderson.

"As tokens of esteem and regard four beautiful wreaths were sent, one by personal friends, one by the Oddfellows and one by the women's institute.

"Born in P. E. I. in 1883, Don came west 13 years ago and after a short stay in Edmonton and Lacombe he settled down in Hardisty in 1907, taking over the business from Erskine & Small. Mr. Donald three years later, bought Gordon Ellis' business which he has run successfully ever since. A man of a sound business man, gifted with an extraordinary faculty for friendship, Don had not only prospered but had gathered around him a host of friends. There was no one who wished him anything but good and his sudden death at the age of 36 has left a gap in the hearts of his many friends.
