MAKING IT PLAIN

To make a success of one's undertaking is a worthy ambition, an ambition without which there can be no real success. On the other hand, to attempt to make it appear that an undertaking has been successful while the word failure is written across it, in unmistakable characters is unpardonable and only makes the failure the more conspicuous.

We have had numerous examples recently of failures camouflaged under loudly heralded success. In our own province we had for four years a government which boasted more loudly of its so-called successful administration than any other government here or elsewhere. Its little life was a continuous paean of self-glorification; it boasted of a surplus and a debt reduction every year and when the truth, long suspected, at last leaked out it was found that there never had been a surplus but on the contrary that there had been yearly deficits and a huge increase in the provincial debt.

In Ottawa we have a similar condition of affairs. On the floor of the House and in almost every government-supporting newspaper from one side of the country to the other there is a continuous shout of glorification over the reduction in the public debt, a reduction that has been proved over and over again has not been effected. Mr. J. B. M. Baxter, one of the ablest men in the House of Commons, declared the other day before a large and intelligent audience that instead of a surplus of \$30,000,000 the government is faced with a deficit of \$50,000,000! A similar opinion was expressed on the floor of the House by many members including some Liberals. One Conservative member offered to resign his seat if a chartered accountant chosen by the government would assert over his signature that there was a surplus, but the government did not accept the challenge although it would be quite willing to pay a heavy price for a Conservative seat.

The tariff changes also, which during their period of incubation and since being announced, closed many flourishing industries and drove hundreds of thousands of people out of Canada, are being hailed by Liberal newspapers as the salvation of Canada while everyone who knows anything knows that these changes were made at the dictation and under the threat of the Progressives.

So Canada is compelled to go on suffering disaster under a Liberal government ridden by a group of Progressives and there is no remedy for it until an election gives the people an opportunity to turn them out.

The X-Ray is the appropriate name of an attractive monthly magazine published by the patients at the Nova Scotia Sanatorium, Kentville. It is a "magazine of health and good cheer" and should be in every home in Canada and particularly in the Maritime Provinces. Among the contents of the April number just to hand are the following "what everyone should know about tuberculosis," by an authority; "The reason why twelve patients entered the Sanatorium too late"; "Why the tubercle bacillus wins out"; "The fight for race betterment"; "Tuberculosis in England and Wales," in which it is shown that the death rate in these two countries has fallen from 300 in every 100,000 population to 100 through the efforts of anti-tuberculosis organizations. NOTES BY THE WAY

The cities of Canada have grown in population much more rapidly than the rural districts during the past decade. This is especially true of the larger cities, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver. This civic growth has an important bearing upon the redistribution of seats in the federal Parliament which must be passed during the present session. It is already planned that Toronto, which is now represented by five members will be given nine under the new arrangement. Down to 1903 Toronto had but three representatives in the House of Commons so the coming increase gives the city three times as many spokesmen as it had twenty years ago.

Ontario as a province will not gain any seats in the new distribution, so that the four additional seats allotted to its capital city must be taken from the country districts which have lost population or failed to increase as rapidly as the big cities. In like manner the Province of Quebec, whose representation is permanently fixed at 65 members, will have additional seats given to Montreal because of its growth which seats will be taken from the outlying counties. Many of the less populous counties have long been much over represented in proportion to the number of their people. This has not been true of the cities. It is not expected that more than a partial equalisation of representation between city and country will at present be made.

Quebec is the pivot province for the readjustment of representation. It has a fixed representation of 65 members and on dividing the population of Quebec by the number 65 the unit of representation is arrived at. This unit in the present case is 36,326. Were it not for the safe guard enacted during the term of the Borden and Matheson Governments by which our Province is guaranteed four members in the House of Commons perpetually the number would be, in the next Parliament reduced to two. This is a matter that should be remembered gratefully by our Island people, especially at such times as when the decennial readjustment comes round.

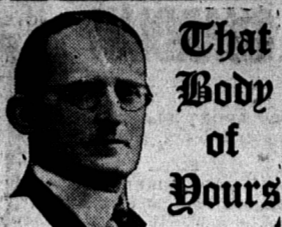
Why should a given number of people living in country districts be privileged to elect more members than a like number who live in a city? The reason is not quite apparent and yet such has always been the rule in Canada. The six leading cities in Canada had by the census of 1921 an aggregate population of 1,658,695, divided as follows: Montreal 618,506; Toronto 521,893; Winnipeg 179,987; Vancouver 117,217; Hamilton 114,151; Ottawa 107,843. The population of Nova Scotia is barely 2,000 greater than that of Toronto yet the Province is now represented at Ottawa by 16 members and the city by five. Redistribution as now proposed will reduce the quota of Nova Scotia to 14 and increase that of Toronto to nine, but that will still come far short of equalising the contrast.

Toronto is a strongly Conservative City and if the Liberal Progressive combination now in power give it four more members than it now has we may be sure that they will be reluctantly given. The same is true of Montreal, if the last provincial election and the recent election of a Conservative Mayor by a large majority afford any indication of its present political leanings. If the unit of representation were followed as a guide Montreal would be entitled to 17 members in the next House of Commons; Toronto would have 14; Winnipeg 5; Vancouver 3; Hamilton 3 and Ottawa 3, the latter by a tight squeeze. This would make 45 members for the six cities.

It is not probable that any wholesale gerrymander will be attempted, but the same end may be attained by an unfair apportionment between the urban and rural constituencies. The Progressives are especially interested in maintaining

By James W. Barton, M.D. A THOUGHT ABOUT THE COMPLEXION

Perhaps, you or your growing boy or girl has considerable trouble and annoyance from unsightly pimples.

It is very embarrassing because they so often appear upon the face. You know that it is from no want of cleanliness, because you have been particularly assiduous in keeping your skin clean.

You try various lotions, and get results that may last for a short time. You then try something else without result.

If you are wise you will consult your physician, and he will likely tell you that it is all a matter of diet.

If you are insistent you can get him to outline a diet for you.

All the skin lotions in the world will not alter the consistency of your blood.

They may be of use in helping the pimples to heal more quickly, but they will not prevent pimples.

The fact of the matter is that you are perhaps manufacturing too much oil, so much in fact, that it gets a bit thickened and does not pour out upon the skin as readily as it should.

You see your skin was meant to be oiled to keep it soft and pliable, and to some extent waterproof.

The tiny openings through which the oil is poured may become clogged with dust which may have harmful substances in it.

This causes an ordinary blackhead to become a pimple.

Don't be satisfied until you have gone after them in the proper manner, diet and exercise.

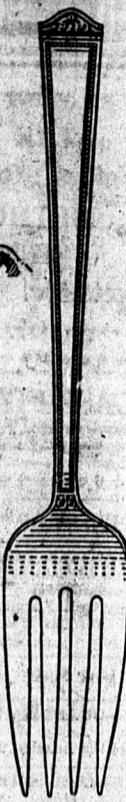

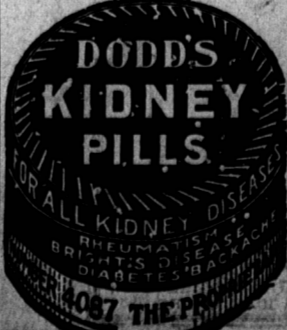
