English Cricket Player Hangs Up New Record

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Aug. 23—The fifth and final England-Australia cricket test has developed into a marathon contest featured by a wholesale smashing of existing records. Holding their ground for 15 hours, English batsmen piled up 37 runs in the first innings, the highest score in Anglo-Australian test matches at the time.

At this point Walter Hammond, England's captain, declared the match and sent the 102-wicket haul to the wickets. His strategy resulted in three good wickets during 117 runs in the closing 30 minutes of a hectic day. Individual honors so far in the 102-run contest are held by 22-year-old Leary, who scored 117 runs, and Bradman, who scored 104 runs. Leary's century was the first in the history of test cricket.

Bradman Out of Match
But the third day's play proved disastrous to the overseas team. Bradman, captain and mainstay of the team, slipped and injured a shin-bone and will be out of the game for some time. H. P. Hendry, who scored 104 runs yesterday, was unable to play yesterday but may play on Australia continues its home tomorrow.

All things considered, advocates of "test cricket" were given a very good sample of what is possible in such games on a good day. With Australia holding the initiative for Bradman and Hendry, and E. L. McCormick, who has been through illness, England's team-ends might have taken the total into four series had Hammond not made his declaration.

Favorites Are Given Stiff Competition In Doubles Tourney At Longwood

(By Bill King, Associated Press Sports Writer) BROOKLINE, Mass., Aug. 23—A wholesale massacre of favorites was narrowly averted today as the men's field in the United States national doubles tennis tournament at Longwood was reduced to the quarter finals, which only four of the eight seeded teams were strong enough to gain.

A quarter of the favorites were wiped out yesterday, another fourth of them retired today and, in addition, the probable finalists, Don Budge and Gene Mako of the United States Davis Cup forces, and Adrian Quist and Jack Bromwich, the Australian aces, were extended to a threatening degree.

Budge and Mako, meeting the stubborn Wayne Sabin of Los Angeles, and Elwood Cooke of Portland, Ore., for the second time in a week, surrendered the first four games before settling down for an uphill battle which won them a 4-6, 9-7, 6-8, 6-3, victory.

Quist and Bromwich had almost as much as they could handle to move through another unseeded pair, Hal Surface of Kansas City, and Donald McNeill of Oklahoma City, for a 6-8, 7-5, 6-3, 6-0 triumph.

The day's major upset came when Sydney Wood of New York, and Joe Hunt of Los Angeles, frittered away a half-dozen easy chances to bow to the unranked Australian team of Harry Hopman and Leonard Schwartz, whose winning scores were 3-6, 6-3, 7-5, 7-6, 6-4.

The foreign lists' casualties were Perenc Pucec and Franjo Kukuljevic of Yugoslavia, who lost to Russell Bobbitt of Atlanta, and Frank Guernsey of Orlando, Fla., the United States intercollegiate titlist, 6-2, 10-8, 8-6.

Neuritis Forces Mrs. Moody To Withdraw From Tourney

(By GAYLE TALBOT Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 23—(AP)—Pained by neuritis, Mrs. Helen Willis Moody today withdrew reluctantly from the United States women's tennis championships beginning Sept. 8 at Forest Hills.

In a letter to the United States Lawn Tennis Association penned what sounded like her farewell to the game. "I have had it made it impossible for her to play since her recent return from England, where she defeated her long-time rival, Helen Jacobs, in the final of the all-England championships. Her physician said recovery from the malady was a slow process, often requiring a year's treatment.

"It is with regret that I come to this decision," wrote the unpredictable queen of the courts. "Without preliminary practice and feeling as I do now, it would not be possible to play in such competition as offered at Forest Hills."

To some extent, she thanked the officers of the U. S. L. T. A. for "their kind attitude of many years standing, their unselfish interest in tennis which has provided for me, along with other players, a very happy time in sports."

Attached to her letter of resignation was her personal cheque for \$1,309.45, representing the amount given her by the U. S. L. T. A. for expenses on her trip to England this summer, when she played on the winning United States Wightman Cup Team. This summer's tennis does more than her withdrawal from the championships.
