The closing session of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation met yesterday morning at 9.30 in P.W. College Hall.

After the minutes of last meeting were read and adopted, Mr. Clark of the Experimental Farm addressed the Teachers re prizes offered by the Horticultural Society of Canada for essays and best kept school grounds in rural districts. Mr. Clark offered many helpful suggestions in planning the lawn and gardens about the school house, and said he would gladly assist by giving shrubs, etc., to any teacher on application for same.

The rest of the morning was passed in considering the reports of the following committees:—Finance, Text Books, Pensions, and Resolutions.

After the general business was concluded the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President—Mr. Morrissey. Vice-Pres.—Mr. Daniel Bell. Sec.—Mrs. Miss Alma Yeo. Rec.—Mr. Cuthbert McLean.

Resolutions were passed that when a reduction is made from the salary of a teacher who is a member of the Federation by reason of a deficiency in the average attendance, and the district fails to pay the teacher, the amount deducted as required by law, the executive at the teacher's request may investigate the circumstances and may assist the teacher to recover the amount due, and make reasonable expenditure of the moneys of the Federation for that purpose; that the Board of Education be requested that every school be equipped with supplementary readers and books on history and other subjects for the use of teachers and pupils; that the executive of the Federation be urged to consider the advisability of requesting the Government to appoint a member of the Federation on the Board of Education; that the Board of Education revise the course in arithmetic so as to omit all useless matter; that in the subjects of English History, Canadian History and English Grammar two text books shall be prescribed, elementary and advanced.

The resolution of sympathy in the death of Mr. J. D. Seaman was observed by the Convention standing in silence for a few seconds. A general resolution which was enthusiastically supported was passed to all those who had in any way assisted in the success of the Convention.

Increase in debt for the year ending December 31st, 1924 of \$24,167.41, but the expenditure on improved highways alone was \$237,067.65.

The difference between the total balance as shown by the Provincial Auditor and that of the External Audit is due to the fact that the Provincial Auditor's report only includes actual cash receipts and payments passing through his department, while that of the External Auditor embraces accrued interest, unpaid accounts and items from other departments of Government. A glance over the subsidiary statements from the several departments will make this difference readily understandable by the Honorable members of this House.

In the External Audit of 1923, considerable sums of uncollected taxes were credited to Assets, and a statement of net liability based thereon. These consisted largely of Poll and other tax arrears, Succession duties, and arrears of Falconwood fees and so forth. Efforts to collect many of these amounts has proven them to be more or less of a liability than an asset. Assets of this nature can only be properly valued when collected.

On motion of Mr. McLean the United Church of Canada Act was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Myers the bill to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Dairymen's Association was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Speaker read a letter from the Private Secretary of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, conveying the information that His Honor presented to each member of the Legislature with his compliments, a copy of his photograph.

At 12 o'clock the House took recess until 1.30 o'clock.
