"FIGHTING MAC" THE COOLEST MAN IN THE ENTIRE BRIGADE

Canadian Veteran of South African Campaign Tells of His Bravery Under Fire of Shot and Shell.

"After General Wauchope's death after the tragic affair at Magersfontein, where the Highland brigade was forced against the Boer trenches under orders from General Lord Methuen in a night attack, a difficult task was entrusted to General Hector MacDonald, said an officer who was with the troops in the South African campaign. "Upon him was placed the task of reorganizing the brigade of Scotch soldiers who had been almost cut to pieces. The Scotchmen had at last a general whom they worshipped, and their ranks were thoroughly reorganized.

The future usefulness of the Highland brigade seems to be gone for the remainder of the campaign. It was General Hector MacDonald, the man who had brought up his forces and saved Kitchener at Omdurman, who took the raw levies sent out to repair the shattered brigade and converted them into an effective force.

"After Magersfontein, the first time the Highland brigade saw active service was at Koodesberg, west of the British position at the Modder River. Hector MacDonald with his reorganized brigade, was sent against the Cape Colony rebels, a portion of whom were afterwards repulsed by the Canadian and Australian troops at Sunnyside. I was a reconnaissance in force which should have been undertaken by mounted troops but the reorganized Highland brigade under Hector MacDonald did what few brigades of infantry have ever done.

"In the heat of a South African summer, the thermometer standing at over 100 degrees of heat, the brigade started out from Modder River and after a series of forced marches, during which not a few of the Highland soldiers were driven mad and ran amuck for want of water and the terrific strain of the march, General MacDonald brought his force into touch with the rebels entrenched in the hills about Koodesberg. After a short but severe action, MacDonald drove them south from their position on the left flank of General Lord Methuen's position. It was a small party of this same force which in February, 1900, was defeated by the Canadian and Australian troops at Sunnyside.

"When Lord Roberts assumed command of the British forces on the western frontier, a short time after, General Hector MacDonald, in command of the Highland brigade, marched from Enslin to the rendezvous of the British column at Ramdam farm. Along with the other brigade of the 6th Division, under the command of General Kelly-Kenny, the Highland brigade, by a series of forced marches, cornered Gen. Cronje at Paardeberg. It was a dismal wet Sunday morning, shortly after sunrise, when General Smith-Dorrien, commanding the 18th Brigade, including the Gordon Highlanders, the Royal Canadianians, the Cornwalls, and the Shropshire Regiment, and General Hector MacDonald commanding the 3rd Brigade, including the Black Watch, the Argyle and Sutherland Regiment, the Seaforth and the Highland Light Infantry, invested General Cronje's position at the ford of the Modder River close to Paardeberg.

"In the general charge that was ordered by Lord Kitchener at sundown over ninety Canadians were killed and wounded. General Smith-Dorrien's brigade advanced against the Boer position on one side of the river, while Gen. Hector MacDonald's brigade advanced against the enemy on the other side of the river.

"It was a fearful day for all the troops engaged in that unsuccessful onslaught on the trenches of Cronje's force. Canada heard the great deal of what the 9th Brigade including the Canadians suffered, but little was known of the awful fire, which the Highland brigade on the other side of the river was compelled to face. It was late on Sunday afternoon when I rode across the drift to General MacDonald's brigade. I met the general riding along a ridge in the rear of the position occupied by the various regiments in his brigade. He had been wounded in the ankle by a rifle ball, but refused to have his wound attended to because he said he could not leave his command. Knowing him well during previous meetings, I rode up and innocently enough asked him where the Highland brigade was. Man of iron as he was usually called by those who knew him, he was evidently suffering from emotion. He replied quickly enough in his short jerky sentences. The Highland brigade! Some of them are in heaven, some of them are God knows where, and the rest of them are down there being potted at by those d—Boers.

"By this time I noticed that the general had been wounded, and remarked to him that his wound should be dressed.

"Without replying, in response to a message brought to him by one of his aides, he galloped away from his staff, which was under fairly good cover, right into the zone of fire in the rear of his brigade, and with bullets ringing about him as he rode, for over half an hour he gave instructions personally to the regimental commanders who were with their regiments in the firing line.

"The following day, after the dead and wounded Canadians were gathered in on the other side of the river, I went over to see General MacDonald at his headquarters. On the way I passed a long trench which had been dug on the side of the slope on the rear of the position occupied the day before by the Highland brigade. In that trench details of the various Highland regiments were throwing those of their comrades who had fallen in the long fight and faithful charge. It was one of the most heart-rending sights I witnessed during the campaign.

"Three hundred dead Highlanders were piled up on either side of the trench and were being dumped in full regiments. A little further on I found General MacDonald surrounded by his staff. He was evidently suffering a great deal from his wound, which laid him up for a long time later on."

This has brought out a sharp letter, of denial, which the Matin publishes from several leading French capitalists interested in the company.

RECEPTION TO KING EDWARD.

LISBON, April 4.—King Edward and King Carlos, accompanied by their suites and with an escort of cavalry, yesterday visited Cintra, the summer residence of the Queen Dowager, and other points of interest in the neighborhood of the capital, returning here last evening. Their Majesties were greeted with enthusiastic demonstrations at various points along the route.

MEETING BETWEEN POPE AND KING

ROME, April 4.—It now seems that the facts about King Edward coming to Rome and the possibility of his meeting the Pope, are that the King has not yet been asked to visit the Pope, and therefore, all the means suggested for the meeting are problematic.

AMERICAN MURDERER CAPTURED.

WOODRICK, N. B., April 6.—Olas F. McVine, aged 30 years, wanted for the premeditated murder of his wife at Marsh Hill, Maine, on Thursday night last, was captured this morning at River Du Shute Carleton Co., on the Canadian side by Deputy Sheriff Foster, of Woodstock, and an American officer.
