 Pens A Line On
 "Our Exhibition"**

We are literally provincial and naturally so to a certain extent. It is noticeable that big affairs like our big show which takes place next week are generally called "Fairs" in the different states of the U. S. and in the Old Land. In early days here our fall gathering was always referred to as "The Exhibition" and with a proceeding people old fashions and customs die hard. It resolves itself to a question of taste and choice in words. Shakespeare says "What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet." But whatever name we choose to call it our big show is growing consistently and fairly rapidly each year. It appears to hold the "spotlight" in the East. The attendance increases each succeeding year and the fame of it goes still farther abroad, thereby insuring a bigger number of tourists synchroizing a visit to P. E. I. with "Exhibition" week. The reduced fares for cars on the ferries cause a great influx of visitors from the mainland of N. B. and N. S., especially. A surprising large number come in motor boats from across Northumberland Strait. The magnitude of our "Show" is not generally realized by the average citizen of P. E. Island. We read of big Exhibitions abroad and perhaps make, in our minds, unfavorable comparisons of our own, and sigh for the impossible, without making any effort to enjoy that which has been placed very handsily within our reach. "Fair" always pastures always look green. The success of this big organization, viz "Provincial Exhibition Co." appears to be due principally to good management. Everything seems to be in precise and clockwork order. There must be some master minds on staff at the head of affairs. The racing program for four days will be as good as any on the

continent. The "thundering herd" will provide the biggest quota of thrills for the masses. The multi-colored habiliments of the drivers always produce a bizarre effect on the conscious and unconscious minds of the spectators. The grand panorama of colored lights during the evening program is a sight not easily forgotten, and best of all is the immense throng of people who will view the whole spectacle and listen to the show barkers and ballyhoo artists proclaim their wares to the world in general. The Bill Lynch Circus will provide amusement for thousands in the outside grounds. A tour of the different concessions may be likened to a sight-seeing trip to many countries of the earth. The vaudeville show in front of the grand stand has assumed enormous proportions in late years and appears this year to be more extensive than ever before. It has five special acrobatic acts including the "flying trapeze" act. The island will be "on parade" (as it were) next week. All nature (of both plant and animal kingdoms) will be at its best. It will be almost incumbent on all native born Islanders to constitute themselves as "major domos" and dispense hospitality principally in the form of courtesy to all strangers, and in fact to everybody. Courtesy and kindness takes a lot of misery out of the world.

WARTS OFTEN REQUIRE TREATMENT BY PHYSICIAN

Warts are small, innocent growths, occurring chiefly on the hands, but sometimes on the scalp and occasionally in the armpits or "voice box," writes a doctor. Though they grow very slowly, one is better without them. Small warts will slowly shrink and disappear if touched daily with glacial acetic acid applied by a glass rod or a match stick. Large ones need cautery. A wart on the scalp can be very troublesome as the comb is always scratching it, and you should let a doctor deal with this or with any fair size wart elsewhere. A wart on the vocal chords leads to hoarseness.

Scores Neglect At Ottawa Of Island Claims

Broken Liberal Promises Reviewed In Rousing Speech By Hon. Dr. MacMillan At Conservative Meeting Thursday Evening

"If I were Premier of this Province I would agitate for another Commission to go again into the whole question of our Maritime claims," declared Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, speaking on Thursday night at the annual meeting of the Queen's County Conservative Association in the Strand Theatre. The speaker, who was Premier when a subsidy increase of \$150,000 per year was obtained for Prince Edward Island under the terms of the White Commission, declared that at that time he had asked the Commission chairman, Sir Thomas White, if the increase could not be made retroactive as from 1927, when the Duncan Commission report was accepted by Parliament. (That report had not only recommended an immediate interim subsidy increase for this Province of \$125,000, but also an early subsidy settlement in full, and this latter provision had not been carried out by the King Government.)

The speaker said he had been assured by Sir Thomas White that while his Commission could not recommend that the \$150,000 increase be made retroactive, the retroactive principle would be taken into consideration when the final settlement was arrived at. "MacMillan," I say no. Very little attention has been paid to the principle. That is the reason why the Chief Justice of this Province, who sat as one of the members of the White Commission, presented a minority report based on our fiscal needs, and with all due deference to the other gentlemen who sat on that case, I claim that the Chief Justice of this Province knows more about our claims than any other man in Canada today. In making his minority report he kept the door open for the possibility of the establishment of a special and section of the roads and had never refused admittance to his office to any one.

Tribute was paid to the generous contribution of some \$75,000 by the life insurance companies to health work in this Province, which appeal from the Campbell Government, because the Maritime Freight Rates Act, passed on their recommendation, has been nullified by the Supreme Court of Canada. And until our freight rates condition is remedied the farmers of this Province are not getting a square deal from the railways," Dr. MacMillan insisted.

"Until we have a government in this Province able and willing to fight for our rights at Ottawa, we shall be paying for it in higher taxes and freight charges."

Subsidy Increases
 Dr. MacMillan, whose address was greeted with enthusiastic applause, reiterated his belief in conservative policies and paid warm tribute to the late Sir Robert L. Borden, to whom this Province owes the Borden-Terminette car ferry service, the widening of the railway gauge, and a subsidy increase of \$100,000 annually which was obtained from the Borden Government through the initiative of the Matheson administration. Following this increase he pointed out, additional subsidies of \$125,000 and \$150,000 per year had been obtained from Ottawa by Conservative governments in this Province. How much, he asked, had the Saunders-Lea Government, or the present Campbell Government, obtained in this manner? Not one red cent! They preferred taking the money from the taxpayers' pockets.

In this connection Dr. MacMillan scored both the federal and provincial Liberal governments for their broken promises with regard to taxation decrease. The sales tax has been increased by two per cent, and a subsidy increase on motor trucks, gasoline, life insurance policies, etc.

visitations. In the Federal arena the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden passed on to his greater reward. As War Premier he held an outstanding record amongst the Empire's distinguished statesmen. At his bier the prejudices of party were set aside and at a state funeral all Canada united in doing honor to the memory of one of our greatest sons. As father and founder of our magnificent Car Ferry he is especially endeared to this Province, a benefaction the memory of which time cannot efface.

"Many others whose names I cannot now recall, those who have passed away, whose works do follow them and to whose families we extend our deepest sympathy. I could not pretend to do justice to that great Empire event, the Coronation of His Gracious Majesty, King George VI. The grandeur of those ceremonies, the world-wide interest displayed, the enthusiasm of loyal hearts, within and without the Empire, through the Press and messages of those attending the ceremonies is now familiar to every Canadian. On my own behalf and on that of the Liberal-Conservatives of this Province we declare our love and loyalty to our newly crowned King and to his beloved consort, Her Majesty the Queen, with the national prayer Long Live the King and Her Gracious Majesty, long to reign over us, happy and glorious. Long Live Our King and Queen.

"Action, or more properly inaction, in the fields of government in Canada and our native Province is a matter of most grave concern. In the world of trade and commerce the darkest clouds of the great depression have lifted and dispersed. Yet regrettably our governments have failed to take advantage of this tide of incoming prosperity to close the doors of unemployment and give the industrial and laboring classes those benefits which Providence has so kindly showered upon us.

"In this testing time it is gratifying to Conservatives to observe that where their trade and financial policies have not been interfered with by incoming governments their objective of prosperity and benefits for the masses has been justified. With these policies left in force and untampered with our trade has increased and commerce flourished and in spite of the inaction of those elected to safeguard our interests.

"These facts are especially noticeable in our own Province. Nature endowed us with a fertile soil. A kind Providence has blessed us with seasonal rains and sunshine and abundant soil crop. The Bennett dairying policy put our butter and cheese industry into the avenues of advancing prices. British and European demand has given substantial price increases on bacon, hams and meat products. The farmer is making a more prosperous time with nothing to hamper his peace of mind but Campbell Government tax gathers with the ever increasing demand for taxes and still more taxes, and the growing dangers of highway travel.

"Time and the events of administration have stamped with approval the record of the Stewart-MacMillan Government. But for their hard surfaced highways and improved roads our plight would now be a pitiful one. Instead of taxing the overburdened they added hundreds of thousands of dollars to our revenues by pressing our claims upon the Federal Government. Were it not for these large increases in our revenue the appalling additions to our taxes by the present Liberal Government would be still further doubled to crush our taxpayers to the verge of bankruptcy.

"In our Province, as in the wider sphere of Federal affairs, the growing discontent of the people is becoming daily more evident. Observing Liberals foresee the tide of popular favor turning against them. Quebec after forty years of Liberal rule, sent the Taschereau Government to ignominious defeat. Premier Hepburn in Ontario, with two years yet to run, is calling an election in the evident hope of snatching a new lease of power before the indignation of electors visits him with annihilation. Bracken in Manitoba is also in the apparent throes of distress. In our own Province the defeat of the Campbell Government is assured. Its leaders are visibly in fear, whistling to keep




