This shipment will mean three more Japanese going to Japan to instruct the people there in the art of raising foxes. Dr. Frank states that there is no need for selling foxes for less than pelt value.

A. to be established at a mining camp in Western Canada has just been started at Anyox the big mining camp of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Company, situated on the Portland Canal on the border of Alaska. Captain H. S. Hinton the secretary undertaking the work came from the opposite corner of Canada, having spent the war period as a Y. M. C. A. worker at Halifax, and prior to that lived at Charlottetown P. E. I.

WEBSTER'S CORNER.—Quite a lot of produce was shipped from here to Charlottetown by boat this fall and splendid prices paid right along. On Friday last, boat day, Hon. J. H. Cummiskey shipped three thousand bushels of oats and potatoes which he paid the farmers 90c a bush for, while Smith Bros. also shipped two thousand bushels of potatoes and a quantity of oats. The boat made two trips from Hickey's wharf to Charlottetown that day. The prices paid here for produce this fall probably averaged the highest on the island, being 90c for oats and 85c for potatoes.
