The first of the string brings together Young Stribling of Atlanta, Ga., and Eddie Hurstman, of Los Angeles, for ten rounds, on February 18. Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., champion of light-heavyweights, tackles Jim Maloney, of Boston, the heavy-fisted destroyer of three foreign threats already during the present indoor campaign.

The European champion Paulina Uzcudum, of Spain, will meet Knute Hansen, of Wisconsin, over the ten round route on February 23. Among the winners of this series, Rickard expects to find material for two big outdoor shows in the Yankee Stadium with the former champion, Jack Dempsey, a possible participant in one of the matches.

From these last fights will be found the challenger to meet Tunney next September.
