Dit Clapper Is Leading In N.H.L.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 10.—The scoring punch which keeps the Boston Bruins and Montreal Maroons in front in their respective sections of the National Hockey League is reflected in the weekly statistics. Dit Clapper, right wing Bruin is the leading scorer in the league in point of actual goals with 27 to his credit, while "Cooney" Welland, centre ice player in a tie for goal getting averages, with Nels Stewart, centre of the Maroons. Each has scored 25 goals. In the American section by virtue of 31 assists added to his 23 goals, Frank Boucher, centre ice man of the New York Rangers, leads the entire league in points with 54. Nels Stewart of Maroon and Hec Kilrea, Ottawa left winger, are tied for the leadership of the Canadian section, each with 36 points, while Joe Lamb of Ottawa, and Normie Hynes, of the New York Americans, are deadlocked for second place each with 31 points.

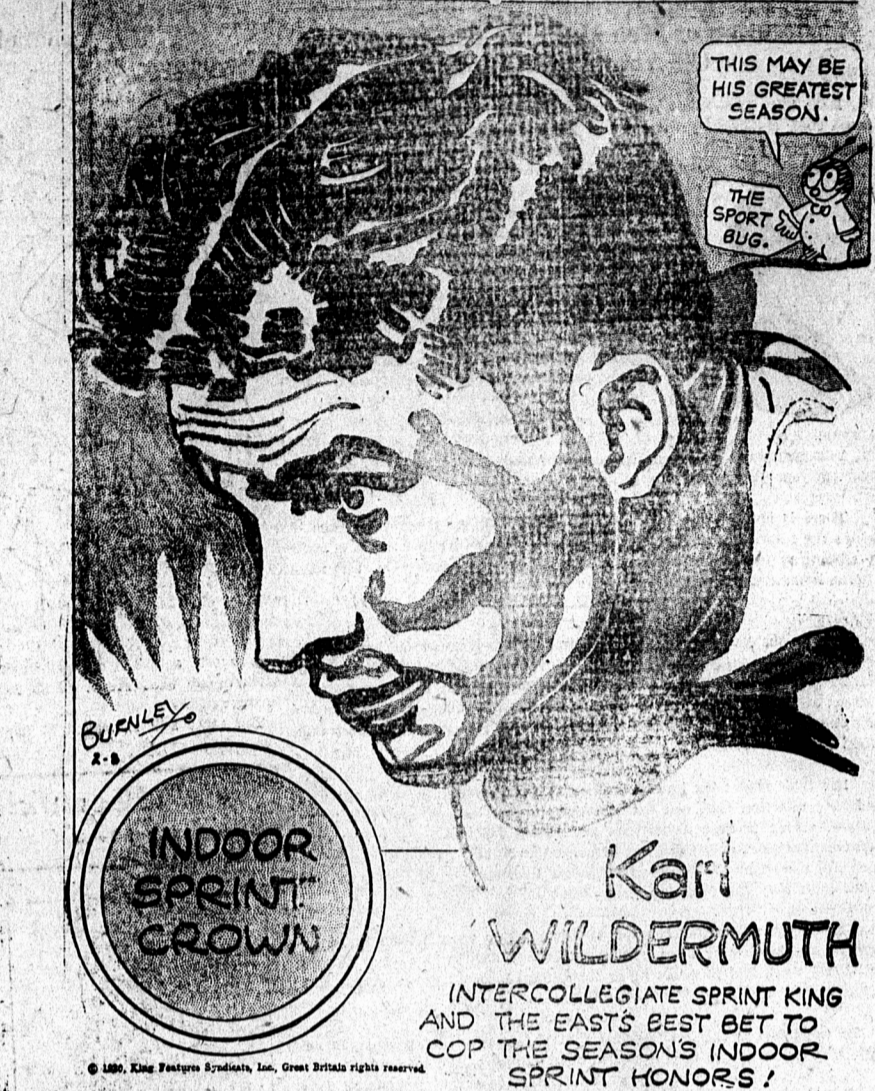

Bill To Amend Pensions Act

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—The bill to amend the Pensions Act will be one of the early measures with which the House of Commons will be called upon to deal. It is understood the Cabinet will give further consideration to the bill this week. It will be referred to a special committee after it has been introduced in the House.

Fishery Production

Saskatchewan's fishery production, in the five years from 1924 to 1928, inclusive, averaged about \$500,000 annually, while its mineral production had a value in 1928 of over \$1,500,000. Coal and building materials are stated to be the principal mineral products, though a growing interest has developed in the recovery of natural salts, such as sodium sulphate. The coals are lignite with high moisture content. The extent of the reserves of lignite in Saskatchewan are estimated at nearly 60,000 millions of metric tons, located in the southern part of the province. Generous provision is made for the Indians in the three provinces of Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia, such as the prescription to them of their fish and game rights.
